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Refugee Problem Shown In Films at St. John's

The subject of the sermon on Sunday morning at St. John's United Church was "Freedom through truth", suggested by the emblem and scripture verse of the next Memorial window in the series, these being "the Lamp with the Book of Knowledge" and the verse "The truth shall make you free."

Rev. John M. Smith's Scripture reading from John, 8, told of Jesus saying these words in the following context with His If: Then saith Jesus to those Jews who believed on Him "If ye continue in my word, then are ye my disciples indeed, and ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free."

Over the entrance to Victoria College are these words "The truth shall make you free," good words for any institution of learning, but particularly where Christian truth is sought. And yet after nearly 2,000 years, as we look around the state of our world, and even into our own lives, even among professing followers of Jesus, we find we are still living in much fear and bondage. Science, with a lot of patience and experiment, has uncovered the truth of a great many of God's physical laws, laws of the carrying of sound, laws of transportation, laws of energy, intellectual truths hidden so long yet always here, truths which have lightened man's labours, brought the world nearer and nearer and almost into a neighbourhood rather than isolated people and places, and yet there is still a great lack of true freedom. Which probably shows that intellectual or scientific truth alone, as handed by man is not sufficient. There is moral truth to be considered. Unless man and knowledge uncover God's moral laws, God's moral truth; show how these work in our lives and in our world; and that unless we obey them and fit them in with the intellectual truths the world has discovered; unless we do this, we cannot have the truth which makes men free and we will still be in bondage to fear and frustration.

But even that is not enough. We still have to learn that there is spiritual truth which must be discovered and obeyed, and fit in with the others before we can be free. We need to recognize that Jesus is the source of the incarnation of truth which comes from God and which makes men free; and that Jesus meant it when He said: "I am the Way, the Truth, and the Life, no man cometh unto the Father but by me." Until we believe and bring all truth, intellectual, moral and spiritual into harmony, so that all are working together for good, for the uplifting of the human race the world over, and drawing man into a closer relationship with His God and God's laws, only then shall we know the truth which will make us free, and the world become, as God wishes it, truly the best kind of world for everyone.

Choir's anthem was: "O for a closer walk with God." Mrs. Kidney taking the solo part. Alfred Tost sang "The Lost Chord."

At the evening service, two movie sound films were shown after opening devotional exercises by Rev. J. M. Smith. The first film, "Nakamia," was the lovely pictured story of a four year old African girl, left as a tiny baby at the door of a Mission home in Angola. She was adopted by one of the native teachers, and the picture showed how, given such a chance of Christian upbringing, she grew into a lovely healthy, happy normal Christian child, with every prospect of becoming a great help to her own people.

The second picture belonged to the Canadian Council of Churches, and depicted the sad plight of millions still refugees of World War II, still unplaced in anywhere near normal life, and living under terrible conditions, most just outside the Iron Curtain in West Germany, no work, no home, underfed, among disease and suffering, with little hope, unless we in our prosperous western world give them a helping hand. Many have been given a new life in many lands, but there are very many left. It has been said that 9 out of 10 of those already helped in the USA were found jobs or homes by the Christian churches. We in Canadian Christian churches have every opportunity to do as well. They are looking to us.
