Acton Minister Was Local Lady's Father

Father of Mrs. Robert Footitt, of
Churchill Crescent, Georgetown,
Rev. H. L. Bennie, 65, died at his
home in Acton on Thursday.

Born at Galashiels, Scotland, he
received his M.A. degree from Trin-
ity College, Dublin, and completed
his ministerial training at Knox
College, Toronto in 1915. That year
he was inducted in the Presbyter-
ian Church in Grafton. Charges in
Uxbridge, Quaker Hill, Mitchell,
and Halifax followed.

In 1930 he was called to Knox
Church, Acton, where he continued
as minister until 1942. He later served
at Elmira, Alma and Duart. His
last charge was at Inglehart and
Tomstown from which he resigned
in 1948 due to ill health.

A Mason and member of Walker
Lodge, Acton, he had also been
clerk of Stratford and Guelph pres-
byteries during his ministry. He
was married in 1916 in Waterloo to
Leta N. Heverson.

Surviving beside his widow are
two daughters, Mrs. Robert Foot-
itt, Georgetown and Mrs. Robert
Adams, Acton, and a son Douglas,
Acton. There are four grandchild-
ren.

Rev. Robert Armstrong conducted
the funeral service on Monday in
Knox Church, Acton, assisted by
Rev. E. A. Thomson, D.D. of Tor-
onto.

WILL CALL SCHOOL TENDERS IN MAY

At their meeting Monday in Mil-
ton, North Halton high school board
were informed by their architects
Barnett & Rieder, that detailed
plans for the building program
should be ready within the next
two weeks.

A special meeting will be called
to view plans for a new Acton school
and additions at Georgetown and
Milton and it is expected that ten-
ders will be called soon after the
meeting.

Milton school is still seeking a
mathematics and PT teacher to
replace principal J. E. Marcellus
who retires in June, and at the
meeting the board learned that Miss
Clara Grindley, commercial teacher
at Acton, is taking a position in
the city and will be resigning from
the staff.

The problem of three students
at Georgetown whose attendance
has not been satisfactory was also
before the board, and the attend-
ance officer will be asked to take
whatever steps are necessary to
see that the school attendance law
is complied with.
