It is stressed that the fire hall must be completed by September 1st, as the old fire hall must be vacated by that time, and the change to dial telephone system will make it necessary for a caretaker to be in the building to answer fire calls.

gent is by legal action. Reeve MacDonald said that county council is much concerned about growing hospital costs, which at present are running about \$5,000 a month.




