Text of Mr. Stevens' report at the meeting is as follows: During the year 1952-53, the committee held six regular meetings. As a result of these organizational meetings, the following activities were processed and exped-

(a) A highly successful countywide chest x-ray survey was conducted in conjunction with the Ontario Department of Health:

The results of this very major effort may be tabled as follows: X-Ray Survey - 1952

Total number x-rayed, 17,549; No evidence of disease or abnormality, 16,997 or 96.5 per cent; Pulmonary tuberculosis 24 or .13 per cent; Pulmonary tuberculosis suspects, 5 or .03 per cent; Other disease and abnormalities 524 or 3.0 per; cent.

These include: Evidence of previous pleurisy, 76; Abnormal heart shadows 65; Tumors, 8. Active Pulmonary Tuberculosis,

8 or .04 per cent. From Oakville 3; From Burlingtton 4; From Acton 1.

H. C. Morris, Oakville, is the new x-rays in local and urban hospitals such x-rays for all hospitalized residents of Halton, when such Hospitalization was not prepaid by a commercial carrier or the Work-

men's Compensation. During the year the Association paid for a total of 593 clinical chest x-rays, at a cost of \$1,108.00.

A further donation of \$2,000 was made by the Association to the Mountain Sanatorium in Hamilton. These annual donations are made by the Association to the Sanatorium in support of the six-bed ward sponsored by the Halton County Tuberculosis and Health Associa-

During the year a total of 24 residents of Halton were admitted to sanatoria. Five were from the town of Burlington and eight were from the town of Oakville.

Also, further donations were made on a per capita basis to residents of Halton County confined to sanatoria other than the Mountain Sanatorium, Hamilton.

Although the sassociation's program of rehabilitation was restricted to a degree, as a result of the enormous amount of work involved in the county-wide chest x-ray survey, at the same time the rehabilitation program was carried on at a satisfactory level. This particular activity continued to pro-

1. Christmas gifts for all residents in Sanatoria; 2. Personal needs as requested by patients from the county; 3. Clothing and similar needs for discharged patients; 4. Special medicines for discharged patients; 5. Equipment and material for discharged patients during initial stages of rehabilitation.

The current Christmas Seal fundraising campaign achieved the greatest success in the history of the campaigns undertaken in this

Openings Available in Herd Improvement Scheme

During the past 3 years, 78 Halton herds have been enrolled in Dairy Herd Improvement work. This has been one of the most popular, if not the most popular live stock extension project ever initiated in this county. This type of cow testing was undertaken primarily for dairymen owning grade or mixed herds of pure breds and grades. As a matter of fact DHIA not only provides the same service rendered by Record of Performance work for pure bred herds but also provides cost of production data on each individual herd. This information, while confidential to the herd owner does enable him to compare his cost figures with the average of his group, as well as with the two high and two low herds. This information in itself, is of sufficient value to cause some pure bred breeders to give consideration to going out and purchasing one or more grade cows in order that they may be-

come eligible under the policy. However, the policy was recently revised by the Ontario Department of Agriculture and under the new regulations, Herd owners must have at least two grade cows in order to qualify for membership. This has resulted in a number of the present' members being unable to qualify and consequently several more herds can be accommodated. Those interested should immediately contact the local branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture in Milton. The new DHIA year commences with the month of May. This means that in order to secure full value from the policy it is important to enroll at once. This is the first time in well over two years that it has been possible to accept new applicants. Once the replacements have been secured, judging by past experience, the membership is likely to remain closed for some
