**Careers Going Begging
United Church Seeks Men**

"Rapid" extension of the United Church of Canada in all its branches is providing openings faster than there are trained men to fill them," Dr. S. B. Stokes, Conference Home Missions representative told the Halton Presbytery at its Spring Court Session. "Do not allow any suitable young person to choose a life vocation without fully considering the claims of Christ's Church," he pleaded as he pressed for more volunteers. Present recruitment for fulltime service in the church is barely sufficient to meet present requirements and the church is needing hundreds of trained dedicated young men and women for the increasing claims of every coming year.

New Church at Fort Nelson
Delegates to the Burlington meeting to inspect Port Nelson to inspect the present church, excellent new site and ambitious architect's drawings for the first building intended to accommodate five hundred with facilities. Construction work is expected to begin in May and to be complete by New Year 1954. The Presbytery approved the appointment of the Rev. David Wren, M.A., B.D., as first fulltime minister of the Charge and voted a request to Headquarters for a subvention of \$1200 towards stipend during the period of building.

School Rally at Burlington
September 20th was the agreed date for the United Presbytery Sunday School Rally to take place in the extensive new buildings at Burlington. This will be marked by arrangements for a Presbytery Visitation of Christian Education work in the Charges on the lines of the very successful first Official Visitation of Charges in February.

Officers for Halton Presbytery for the year 1953-54 were appointed as follows: Chairman: Rev. R. Keith Love, B.A., B.D., Burlington, Secretary, Rev. J. W. Stewart, Trafalgar, Treasurer, Mr. J. S. Torry, Freilton. Executive Committee includes the above together with Rev. J. M. Smith, Georgetown, Mr. W. R. Hume, Milton and Mr. Stanley Turner, Hornby.

Rev. W. R. Lake Leaving
No notices of removals of ministers from the Presbytery on June 30th were brought forward apart from the information from Rev. W. R. Lake of a call to Kincairdine in the Presbytery of Bruce which is still in the process of confirmation. Mr. Lake has served two years in Halton at the Lowville Charge since coming to Canada from England and will be moving to a more extensive work at Kincairdine with the good wishes of his colleagues and the congregations at Lowville and Zimmerman.

FARM NEWS

**WET WEATHER HELD
UP HALTON SEEDING**

Seeding operations were practically at a standstill in all sections of Halton the week of May 4th. A goodly percentage of Halton farmers had completed the sowing of cereal grains before the wet weather set in. Many on the heavier, more level farms are wondering if their seed grain "would be better still in the bags." Some of the earlier sown grain on the loamier more rolling fields is coming along nicely. However, as intimated above, some of the more poorly drained fields are still waterlogged and the grain appears spotty. Quite a percentage in the northern half of the county were still waiting, on Friday evening for soil conditions to improve so that they could make a start. From a county standpoint we would estimate that 65 to 70 per cent of the cereal crop has been sown. Judging by weather conditions on Saturday morning many Halton farmers would be out on the land, if not on Saturday, then certainly not later than Monday.

Winter wheat, meadows and pastures all appear to be in excellent condition. The cool backward spring has retarded growth but the warmer weather of the past few days has really pepped up the meadows and pastures.

Last summer's drought conditions were hard on the new seeds in some sections. However, there was little or no winter killing and in general the over winter crops are looking well.
