Coaching the team will be a real lacrosse veteran, Clark Lyons, senior player last season with West York. The boys play their first game on May 29 at Oshweken against an all-Indian team.

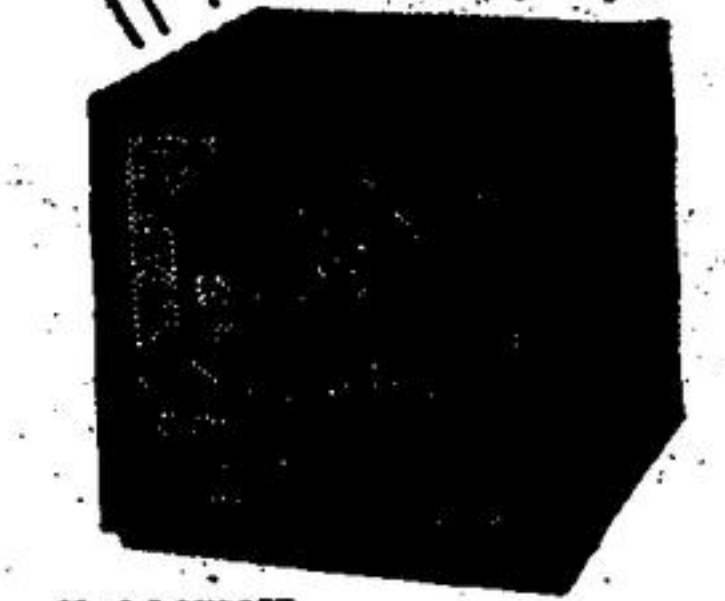
