Lions Pledge \$1000 For Swimming Pool

A \$1,000 donation from Georgetown Lions Club will boost Georgetown's financial campaign for a swimming pool if the fact-finding committee decides to go ahead with the project.

At a directors' meeting of the club last week, the Lions decided to forego this year's Stay-at-Home Camp and donate the money which would be spent on the camp to a swimming pool. The club has also offered a building lot on Water Street beside the post office as a site for the pool.

Some weeks ago, Mayor Armstrong appointed a committee representative of most local organizations to investigate the possibility of building a pool, and there seems every likelihood that the project may be started this year.

The Lions Club will, in place of sponsoring the two-week camp, have an annual picnic for district children, similar to the one which has been a Stay-at-Home Camp feature each year.

Another current project is the erection of swings in the Wigglesworth School playground, which was the club's gift to the new school when it was opened last fall.

Employed 33 Years At Old Papermill

Employed at the old Provincial Paper 'lower mill' for 33 years prior to his retirement when the plant closed in 1948, Joseph Henry Hills, 67, died in Guelph General Hospital on Thursday.

Born at Ballinacree, he was the son of Ephraim Hills and Jemima Roszel, and had lived in Georgetown since 1918. He was a member of the United Church and a lifetime member of Georgetown Fire Brigade. He was a member of the Provincial Quarter Century Club. He was married to Elsie McMaster in Woodstock in 1907.

Surviving are his wife and a family of nine children, Roy Hills, Mrs. Roy Norton (Helen), Floyd Hills, Gordon Hills, Mrs. George Johnson (Jessie), Mrs. Jack Norton (Gertrude), and Paul Hills, Glen Williams, Mrs. Charles Davies (Marjorie) and Mrs. Lloyd Keir (Beatrice) of Georgetown. A son William died in 1911 and another son, Ervin was killed serving with the Canadian Army Overseas in 1944.

Mr. Hills was predeceased by three brothers and three sisters. His only surviving brother is Dolph Hills of Georgetown. He leaves also 31 grandchildren and 7 great-grandchildren.

Rev. John M. Smith conducted the funeral service on Saturday at the McClure Funeral Home, and interment was made in Hillcrest Cemetery, Norval. Pallbearers were Stan Lyon, Jack Davidson, Harry Savings and Henry Shepherd, Georgetown, Clifford Stover, and Frank Jones, Milton.

Five Motor Accidents On Holiday Week-End

Damages totalled about \$1000 in five separate motor accidents in town and district over the holiday week-end.

Only one person was injured, John Deacon, a passenger in a car involved in an accident at Stewarttown, who was treated at Stewarttown by Dr. A. McAllister. The accident occurred when a car driven by Carman Copland, travelling north through the village turned out to pass a parked car and met a south-bound car driven by Floyd Zeigler. Both drivers veered their cars the same way and collided and the Zeigler car continued on and struck a pole near the community hall. Mr. Deacon was a passenger in the Zeigler car, which was damaged to the extent of \$300. PC Howard Gunn investigated the accident which occurred early Monday morning.

Damages totalled \$300 when cars driven by Gordon Lane and Henry Larsen met at the Edith and Church Street corner Saturday night. Mr. Lane was driving along Edith St. and Mr. Larsen was driving east on Church.

Turning into his driveway on John Street Saturday night, William Duffy's car collided with one driven by Robert Webster, with damages to the cars estimated at \$100.

The 9th Line-Papermill Road intersection was the scene of another collision Thursday morning, when Fred Leeder's car travelling south on the 9th Line was in collision with Mal Beaumont's car, travelling in the opposite direction. About \$150 was the extent of damages.

Monday night, William Cunningham turned off No. 7 Highway onto the 9th Line and his car collided with George Preston's, travelling towards the highway. \$100 damage was caused to the cars.

The four local accidents were investigated by the local OPP detachment, under the direction of Cpl. Joseph McBain.

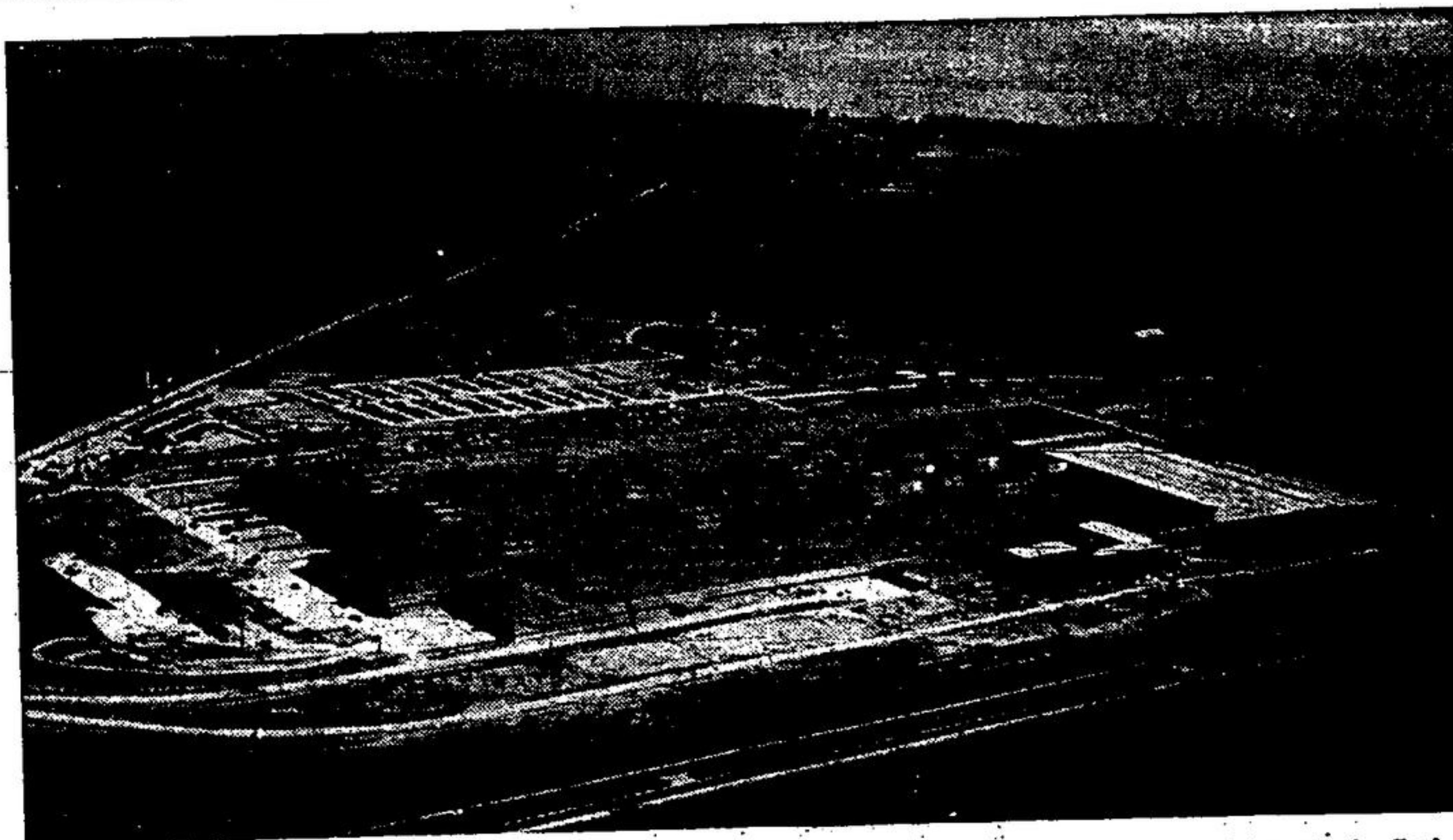
