**ANNUAL MEETING BIBLE SOCIETY**

The annual meeting of the local branch of the Upper Canada Bible Society, an auxiliary of the British and Foreign Bible Society was held on Wednesday night in St. John's Memorial Hall. Rev. John M. Smith was assisted by Rev. A. Calder and Rev. A. J. Barker in the devotional exercises, with Mrs. C. O. Thompson sent his regrets at not being able to be present on account of illness.

Rev. John M. Smith welcomed those present and the guest speaker Rev. W. Harry Moore, and then called on J. D. Godfrey, local president, to take charge of the meeting. Mr. Godfrey briefly outlined some of the newer work the Bible

Society is doing, especially in Japan, Korea, and Africa, helping to lay a Christian foundation in these and other lands, which it is hoped can be built on more freely in the not too distant future.

He then introduced the Rev. W. Harry Moore, district secretary, who gave a much appreciated address on the influence of the bible in a great many lands, even where Christian missionaries are at present not allowed to go, basing his remarks on Paul's word to the Thessalonians: "Finally, brethren, pray for us, that the Word of the Lord may have free course and be glorified." This is the prayer and hope of the Bible Society and to which end it is doing a splendid work in the translating of the Scriptures into so many new languages and dialects, so that so many more peoples and tongues can read the Word of God for themselves or have it read to them, often with much surprise and a great deal of delight, and appreciation. Mr. Moore then showed a sound film "The Bible on the Table" which showed the great value of having the bible handy on the table at all times and its influence there, especially in keeping faithful the practice of regular family worship with its uplifting influence on a growing family.

After thanks to Mr. Moore, the secretary-treasurer Watson Winfield read the minutes of last meeting and gave the treasurer's and auditor's reports. These showed the sum of \$265 sent to head office last year.

Officers elected were: President, J. D. Godfrey; secretary-treasurer, Watson Winfield; vice presidents, the resident ministers; other representations, Presbyterian, Miss J. McDougall; Anglican Harvey Dewhurst; Limehouse, Mrs. Harvey Norton; St. Alban's to be appointed. Rev. John M. Smith closed the meeting with the benediction.
