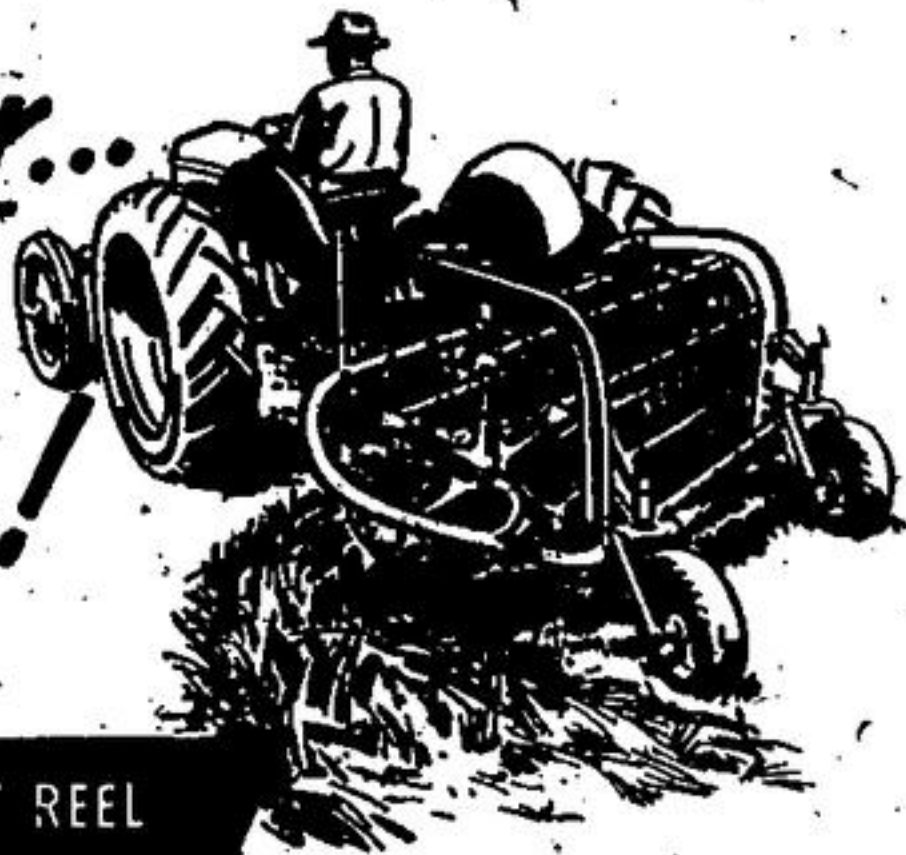

Many Items on Agenda Ontario Council Annual

At a meeting of the Local Council of Women on Friday at the home of Mrs. R. T. Paul, Mrs. J. W. Kerr presided and gave a report of one day's business at the annual meeting of the Provincial Council of Women at Orillia last week. Mrs. Kerr and Mrs. A. R. Vannatter attended this meeting.

Major Hicks of the Salvation Army conducted the morning devotions and gave an inspiring address on "The Power of Prayer." The mayor of Orillia extended greetings. The citizens committee asked that the Local Councils approach the government to subsidize local school boards which have been sharing costs of teaching new citizens. A protest was made against liquor advertising on television and the showing of certain films, and members wish to have two ladies appointed to the board of censorship.

As the province is short of teachers, a subsidy should be granted for their education, the ladies believe. Dean Macdowell of London reported on mental health. Eight thousand people are engaged in psychiatry and therapy, thus enabling many mentally ill persons to resume normal life.

The Peterborough Local Council wants a 20 mile speed limit through towns and school areas, and the police given authority to deal with offenders. A good report was given on the work of the Girl Guides. Miss Briethaupt's report on arts and letters drew attention to the trend towards the cultural side of life and cited the growth of the Don Valley School of Art from 60 to 400 members and its greatly increased facilities, as an example.

The poor-wearing qualities of nylon hosiery caused a lively discussion. This report was handed to the consumers committee. From Mr. Dunlop, minister of education, Mrs. Ross of Toronto urged that the best of TV and radio be demanded, for the education of children and adults. Early diagnosis of cancer and other diseases was discussed.

At Friday's meeting, Mrs. Paul reported having sent a large bundle of clean, white cotton to the Canadian Cancer Society in Toronto. Five dollars was voted to the Leper Mission and a one dollar subscription for a pamphlet issued for the aid of crippled civilians. A request was received for old clocks, watches or any mechanical articles which might be repaired, thus giving these handicapped members of society a chance to learn new skills which, in many cases, lead to earning capacity. The members of the council will forward any useful donation received. Two solos by Glenna Doherty were much enjoyed. The president, Mrs. Kerr, will be hostess for the June meeting.
