



DISTINGUISHED ARTIST TOWN LECTURER



Some factual material about a recent Georgetown visitor, Nicholas Hornyansky, was intended for inclusion in an earlier edition of the Herald, but space did not permit it at the time. The following will be of interest both to those who heard Mr. Hornyansky speak and to those who were unable to attend his demonstration which we have been told was one of the most interesting and educational ever presented in Georgetown.

Mr. Hornyansky was born in Budapest and at an early age studied art at the Academy of Fine Arts in the city of his birth. His progress was rapid. At the age of 16 he was a co-exhibitor at the Grand Salon, and a short seven years later was a recognized portrait painter. His studies took him to Germany, Austria, Holland, Belgium, France and England. With his travel the scope of his media increased. He became a prominent etcher and his work in coloured aquatints have been especially admired. Before coming to Canada in 1929 Mr. Hornyansky's etchings and paintings formed a part of the permanent collections of many Canadian galleries and Museums of Fine Art.

Mr. Hornyansky settled in Toronto and his first exhibited figure painting, the Ice Man, was acclaimed by critics and artist and his figure compositions were from then on part of the Royal Canadian Academy and Ontafio Society of Artists annuals. Elected to membership of the Canadian painter-etchers society, and to that of the Graphic Art Society, he devoted himself to print-making and won the international award of "50 colour prints of the year" (American Federation of Art) in 1932-3. He participated in exhibitions of the California Printmakers, Philadelphia Society of Etchers, Northwest Printmakers, Seattle, the American Academy of Design, Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Art, Society of American Etchers, and the American Colour Print Society.

Since 1939 Hornyansky organized the touring exhibitions of the Painter-Etchers. These "Library and Gallery tours" as they have become known are looked forward to each year by most of the cities from Hallfax to Vauncouver. He also organized the Military Camp tours, War Services Dept., of prints and later extended its scope to include watercolours and paintings and the donation prints to military camps. The Canadian participation in the Graphic Art of the Western Hemisphere and the "50 Canadian Prints" in the USA were also under his direction.

His work is well represented in the National Gallery, Ottawa, Royal Ontario Museum, London, Ontario Gallery, the National Print Collection of USA Library of Congress, Washington and the Central Public Library, New York, Not to be outdone a goodly number of his original colour prints are gracing the walls of homes in and around Geor-

Since 1945 he has been helping young Canadian artists as an instructor of etching at the Ontario College of Art.


