wood Thursday. He leaped clear

caught fire.

The young district farmer, well-  
known here as an exhibitor at  
Georgetown Fair, said he was side-  
swiped by an unidentified car  
passing the "Half-way House" at  
the Forbes Garage corner in Rock-  
wood. He told police he lost con-  
trol of the car on the curve, travel-  
led about 75 feet up the side of the  
road and was turned completely  
around.

The car landed against a fence  
with its two left wheels up in the  
air. The car burst into flame im-  
mediately and was a total wreck.  
Joyce was alone, driving towards  
Guelph in a light rain when the  
accident occurred about 8.45 p.m.

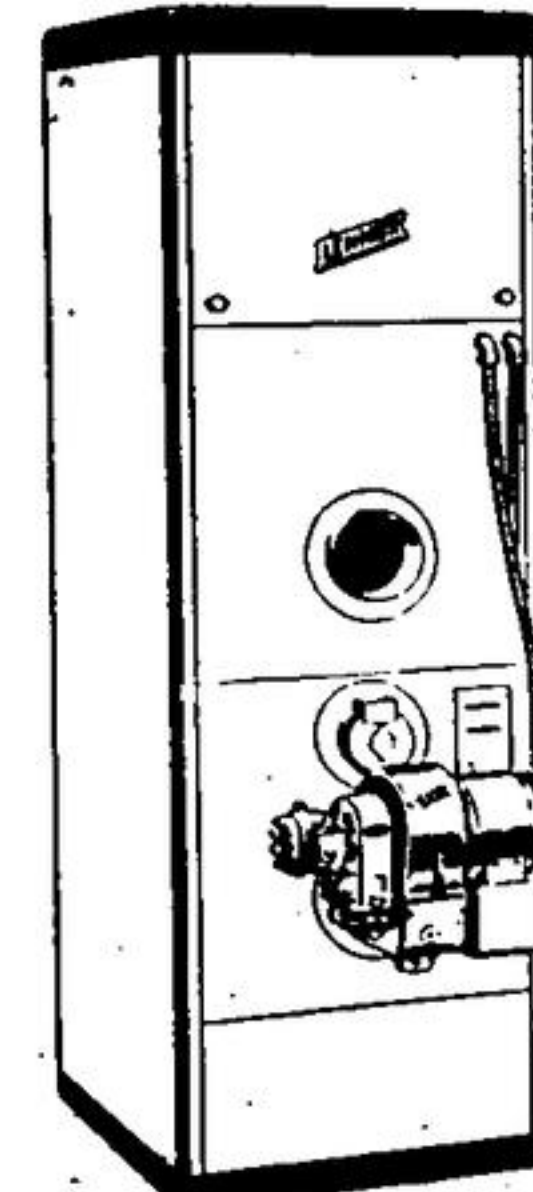
