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ROXY THEATRE TO HAVE CINEMASCOPE

Georgetown, with 25 other Ontario theatres, will have CinemaScope installed.

National Theatre Services, Ltd., Toronto, has ordered installations from Twentieth-Century-Fox in the theatres, it was announced recently by Sam Fingold, head of the company.

Besides the local Roxy Theatre, others in the district will be in Acton, Milton, Burlington, Cooksville and Woodbridge.

Other theatres in Owen Sound, Midland, Carleton Place, Chesley, Dundas, Cornwall, West Hill, Winchester, Ottawa, Port Stanley, Walkerton, Kingston, Hamilton, Uxbridge, Oshawa, Markham, St. Thomas, and Stouffville, controlled by the company, will have CinemaScope installations this year.

Charles Wall is UWO Medical School Grad

A man who received his early schooling at Ashgrove and at Georgetown High School, Charles Banting Wall graduated as a doctor and received his degree at the University of Western Ontario convocation on Saturday.

Dr. Wall is named for two famous medical men, the late Dr. Banting and Dr. Charles Best. His father, Arthur S. Wall, who died when young Charles was a baby, worked as a lab technician with Banting and Best when they were carrying on experiments which led to their discovery of insulin. Dr. Wall's mother, Mrs. Albert Smith, lives in Acton. He spent his boyhood with his grandparents the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Hulls and moved with them to Port Elgin where he finished his high school course. He served with the RCAP during the war, and entered medical school after his discharge. Last year he married the former Phyllis Mallett of Ottawa. Dr. Wall will intern at St. Joseph's Hospital, London.
