About eight years 'ago the first atomic bomb was exploded in New Mexico. Since that time a total of over 30 alomic explosions have been set off, two in Japan, three in Russia one in Australia and the rest in the Pacific and the United States. During these eight years the most unseasonable weather has prevailed over large sections of the world. An excessive number of floods, hurricanes, droughts, and very severe winters, in places where mild winters are normal have done enormous damage. As just one example of the abnormal weather there has been three times the usual number of tornadoes in the United States so far this spring. If a small quantity of dry ice scattered on a cloud from an airplane, can cause a rainstorm, surely there is reason to suspect that enormous quantities of radio active dust, carried vast distances by winds through the upper atmosphere, may be the cause of our weather troub-
