Everest Climbers Inspire St. John's Sermon Topic

The theme for Sunday morning service at St. John's United Church was "Enemies of faith", under the texts, "Fight the good fight of faith", from Timothy, and from-Ephesians, "We wrestle not against flesh and blood but against principalities and powers."

Rev. John M. Smith cited the triumph of the climbers of Mount Everest this past week as encouraging and heartening news, not because of the value of the achievement itself, but because it shows that there are still those with a great deal of courage and perseverance who are willing to sacrifice comfort and safety, self if necessary, to attain some high ideal, something always before them which has not been conquered or reached something which has defied all efforts hitherto. And even with Mount Everest conquered, there are still many, things left to try the resources of man, for though he has overcome so much of our physical earth and sky, learned how to fly even faster than sound, to send words and pictures through the air in a matter of seconds, yet he has not learned to live with himself nor with his brother man as he should, often not even as he has a great desire to do, and feels he should. He has still enemies to conquer in the living of his own life and in living with the rest of the world, and most of these are enemies from within. He needs faith like the climbers of Mount Everest, that even though there may be many failures, still the goal can be reached. And he should know that God is his best helper, that God is able to help. He knows the way and is able to impart that knowledge to us through Jesus through His own Word, through our waiting upon Him, and so give us strength and guidance to accom-

More than that God desires to help. That is why He sent His son Jesus to live amongst us, even die for us, showing His great love for us, and desire to be our helper, so that we can the better be able to conquer the enemies of our faith and reach the heights of living He wishes for us. And let us be assured that God is available and we can have his help for the sincere seeking and asking, again through Jesus His Son, through His example and teaching. God was always available to Jesus, and carried Him through to complete triumph over the greatest enemies of our faith and lives. And such is His wish for us. One enemy we need to overcome is the loss we have sustained of the sense of true values, and try even making a living, vital necessity though it may be, cannot rightfully claim first place.


