### DIAL INSTALLATIONS TO BEGIN LATER THIS MONTH

Installation of dial telephones in homes, offices and stores served by the Georgetown exchange will begin about June 22nd, marking another step forward in preparation for the conversion of the Georgetown telephone system to dial operation, W. O. Misener, Bell Telephone manager for this area, announced this week.

The new dial exchange is scheduled to go into operation in September. At that time, all telephone numbers here will be changed to a new numbering system including an exchange name, Triangle 7, and four other digits. The complete number should always be used in advertising and for out of town calls. However, it will be possible to make local calls by dialing only the last four digits.

Because of the number change, Mr. Misener advised business men who have their telephone numbers printed on letterheads, signs and other publicity media to order only limited supplies of such material prior to the cutover. It will be possible in orders printed at the Herald, to have a certain quantity printed with the present number, and the balance printed with the new.

About 1,800 dial telephones will be installed in subscribers' premises within a few weeks after June 22. The old telephones will not be removed yet as they will continue in use until the conversion.

Besides installing the telephone, Bell Telephone men will explain its use and operation to the subscriber and members of his family and staff and answer any questions they may have about use of the instrument.

Referring to other projects connected with the conversion, Mr. Misener said they were all proceeding according to schedule. The building is finished and the installation of the dial switching equipment is well under way. The extension of outside wires and cables and their adaption for use under the dial system are making good progress.

### William Gibb Ordained Will Move to Sudbury

Rev. William Alexander Gibb, student minister for the past four years at United Churches in Ballinacree, Churchill and Melville was one of three who were ordained into the ministry last Wednesday night in Westdale United Church, Hamilton.

The ceremony was performed as part of the 29th annual session of Hamilton Conference. Dr. E. M. Aitken, president of Hamilton Conference officiated. Other ordinands were Alvin Lloyd Evans, B.A., B.D., of Guelph presbytery and J. W. Shaver, B.A., B.Sc., B.E.



In his sermon, Dr. Aitken referred to the "high calling of God" that the new ministers would have to be prepared to undertake. "We tend to lose sight of the divine calling of God by pulling down the ministry to the commonplace," he said. "We must all try to recapture the true nature of our calling."

To the ordinands in particular, Dr. Aitken suggested a series of necessities that they should possess. Courage, tempered with good judgment, love, a deep and abiding faith and a well-regulated spiritual life, are all virtues that a minister should own. "And don't be a 'regular guy,'" said Dr. Aitken. "If you talk down your vocation and tell so-called funny stories, you are certainly not going to enhance the prestige of the ministry."

Mr. and Mrs. Gibb and their family will be leaving Ballinacree later this summer for his first charge as an ordained minister, and will be succeeded here by another student, Norman Russ of Hespeler.

### Will Return to Africa As Medical Missionary

At the regular morning service at the Baptist Church on Sunday, Rev. Alfred J. Barker chose as his sermon "The Lord's Supper" which is a bond of unity amongst Christians. It confessed unto the Lord what he has done for us. It analyzes the great bridal feast of the Lamb and signifies we eat of the body and drink of the blood of Christ. The ordinance of the Lord's Supper climaxed this service. Mrs. R. Buttrey and Miss B. Thompson sang a duet "Jesus Thou Joy of Loving Hearts."

In the evening, Rev. Samuel Sankoh from Sierra Leone, Africa occupied the pulpit. Mr. Sankoh told of his experience and life, how he was converted by an English missionary from Mohammedanism to Christianity at the age of 12 years. He received nothing but persecution from his people when he became a Christian, but his main desire was to serve his Master.

He stressed the fact there are five million people in Sierra Leone and only thirteen doctors, hence the dire need for men to hear the command of God "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel." He requested the white race share with the coloured people in this distant countries some of its wealth and talents to ameliorate poverty and ignorance which are so prevalent. We should at all times embrace and uphold this great missionary cause with our prayers and gifts. When Mr. Sankoh completes his education at the University of Toronto where he is studying medicine, he plans on returning to his native land as a medical missionary.

The choir anthem was "What Grace, O Lord."

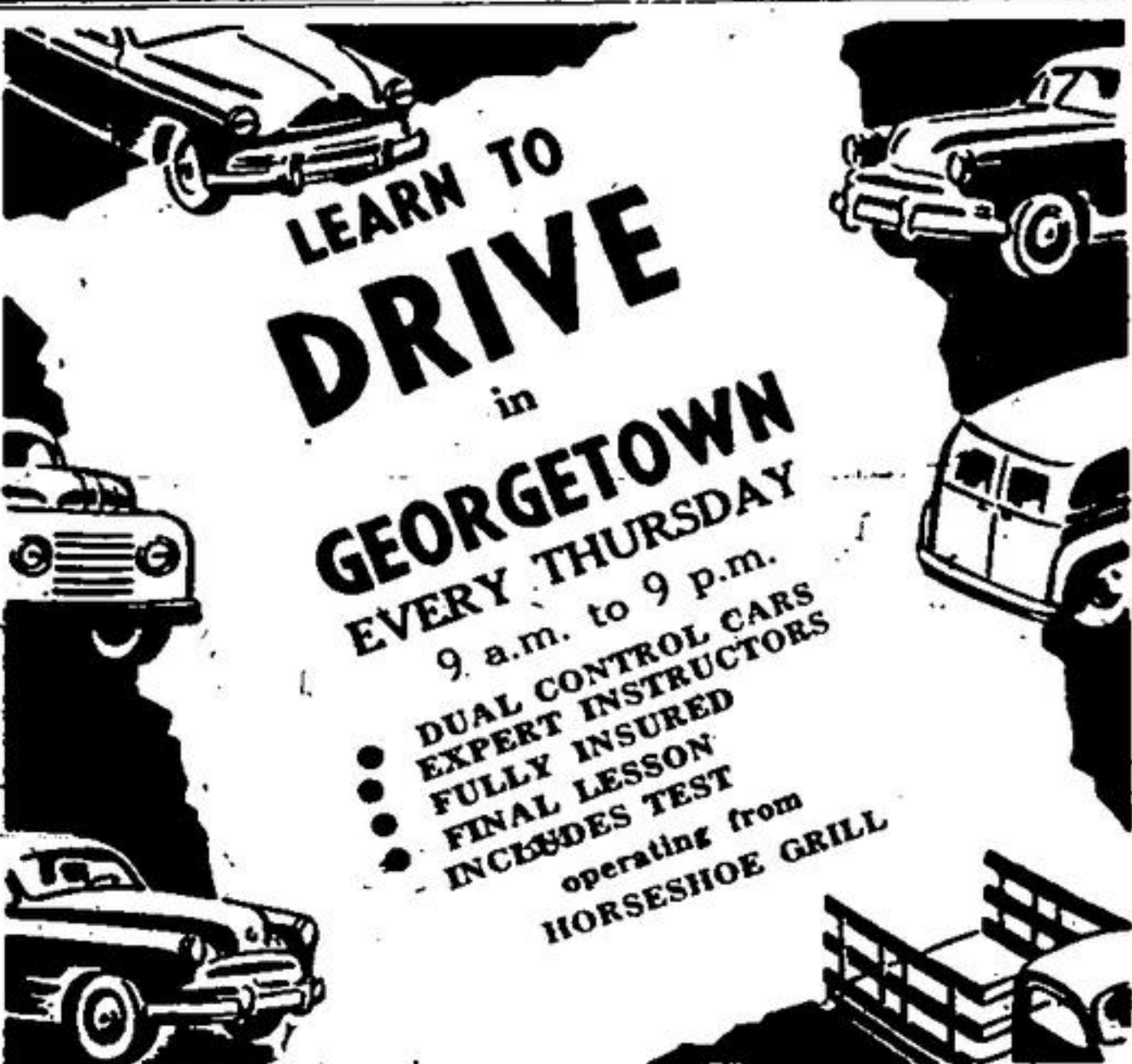
