

St. Laurent to Address Mammoth Liberal Rally

Halton County has been included on the itinerary of Rt. Hon. Louis St. Laurent for his forthcoming tour, it was announced this week by Ken Giles, president of the county Liberal association. The prime minister will address a mammoth rally in Wallace Park, Oakville, on Friday afternoon, June 26th.

Following a lengthy meeting of the riding executive last week-end, Mr. Giles stated arrangements are going forward to accord Mr. St. Laurent a "typical all-out Halton welcome" when he arrives at the park for the rally. "This is the first time Canada's prime minister has ever visited this county on a speaking engagement, and we aim to make the occasion a memorable one!" he declared.

Murray McPhail, who will carry the party's standard in the August 10th election, announced that, in the event of unfavourable weather, the rally would move indoors at the Oakville Memorial Arena. Mr. McPhail explained that the executive is arranging to have a full contingent of school children join their elders in welcoming the prime minister, while several outstanding Halton bands will be on hand for the gala occasion. The rally will commence at 3 p.m.
