**Ernest Forgrave Speaker
St. John's Flower Service**

Sunday morning service at St. John's United Church was a very happy occasion. It was the annual flower service and Sunday School anniversary. The church was beautifully decorated with many kinds of flowers and evergreens; a large white-lettered WELCOME banked on evergreens across the front of the organ. The white gowned junior choir filled the choir loft to capacity; their faces very happy. Then the Sunday School ranged around the pulpit and the front pews.

The junior choir sang three numbers while the congregation was gay, then, then opened the service proper with their Welcome Song. The service was fully musical with a number of choruses along with the hymns and psalm, the following taking solo parts: Agnes Nelson, Gail McGilvray, Lorna Klingbeil, Sally McDonald, Marilyn Souther and Tom Forgrave. Judy McCumber recited the scripture lesson, Luke 2: 42-52; Rev. John M. Smith led in Devotions and also thanked Mr. Norman Laird and the Junior Choir for their large part in the service and for their enthusiasm.

Mr. Ernest Forgrave, Sunday School superintendent, gave the address "Suffer the little children to come unto me," using Mark 10: 13 to 16, which three of Mr. Jack Runham's boys class repeated for him. Mr. Forgrave told the story of Jesus, tired with long walking and teaching, seeking to rest a little, and being probably surrounded by His Disciples so that they could restrain the crowd, and give Jesus his opportunity. And then the mothers' pressing forward with their children to get Jesus' blessing for them. The disciples, thinking of Jesus' comfort, drove them back, but Jesus did not like that and so said "Suffer the little children to come unto me, and forbid them not, for of such is the Kingdom of God."

Jesus must have liked and loved children and confirmed it by saying "Whoever shall not receive the Kingdom of God as a little child, he shall not enter therein." This was an admonition for the adults; then and now. Mr. Forgrave felt that this kindness of Jesus, should make us all want to learn as much as we can about Him, His life, death and resurrection, "from our bibles, our Sunday School teachers, our church, and be ready at all times to help our Sunday School all we can to fulfil its aims.

These are: 1. To bring girls and boys to a saving knowledge of Jesus; 2. To train them for His service; 3. To encourage and direct them into service for Him. He reminded us of the legend about Jesus, going back to heaven and being questioned by Gabriel how it had fared with Him. Jesus answered "They crucified me."

"Then your mission was a failure," said Gabriel. "Oh no," said Jesus, "I left my disciples to carry on." "What if they fail?" said Gabriel. Jesus answered "I have no other plan." So it becomes us to be faithful and carry on.
