Receives D.F.C.**

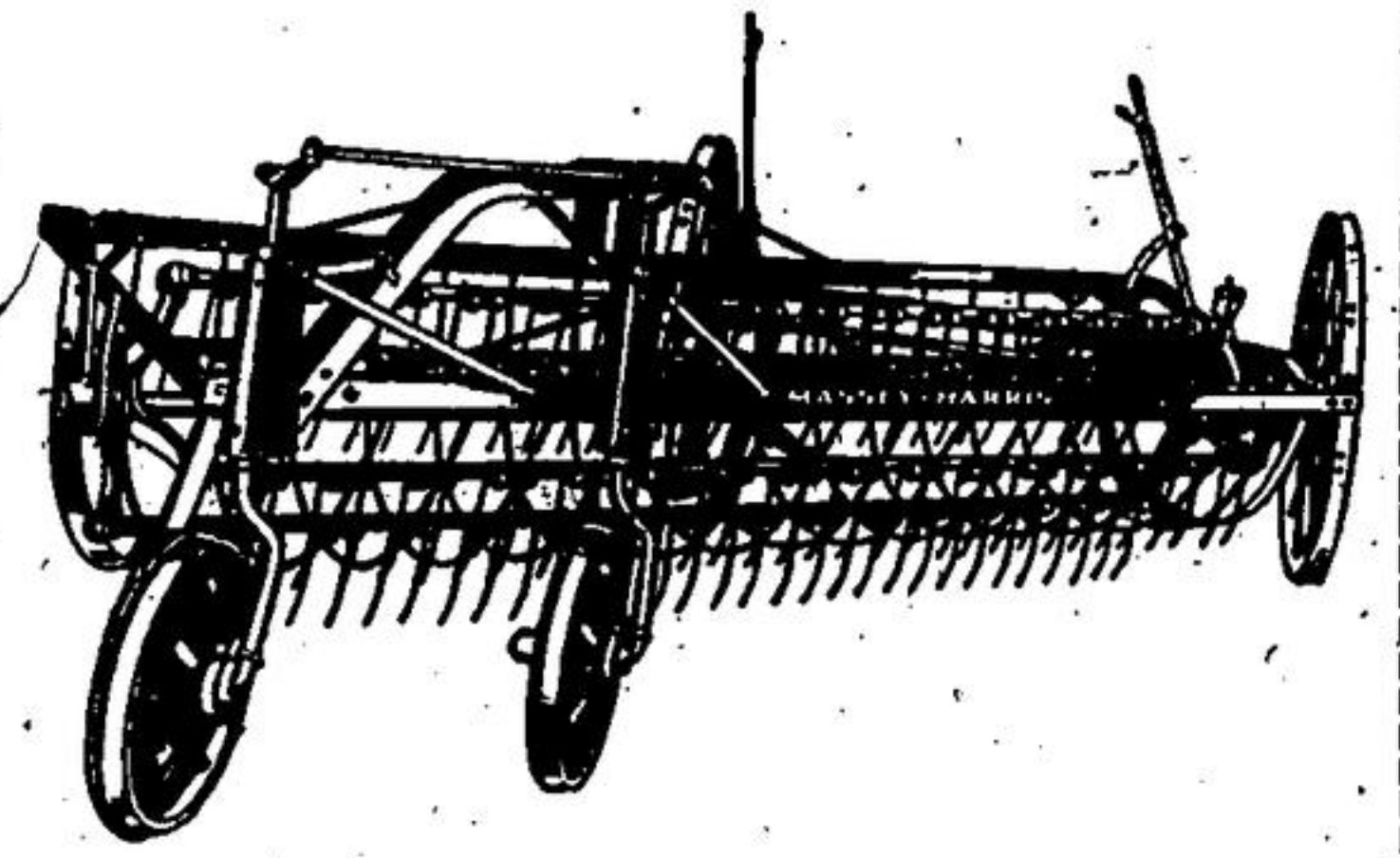


GERALD A. MUSGROVE
