On May 4th, the Council of the Township of Esquesing passed a by-law setting up a Planning Board, composed of Reeve George Leslie, Deputy-Reeve Wilfrid Bird, Lt.-Col. G. O. Brown. Mr Edwin Harrop and George Somerville.

The Board held their inaugural meeting in the Council Chamber at Stewarttown on Wednesday evening, June 3rd, when G. O. Brown was appointed chairman, Edwin Harrop, vice chairman, and K, C. Lindsay, secretary. Five deeds were approved for registration. *

The purpose of the Board is not to prevent or interfere with the sale of property in the township, but rather to assist property owners who are selling lots off their property, to plan the shape and size of lots and provide for roads or streets which might be necessary in the future, in such a way that future trouble and embarrassment will be avoided as far as possible.

Norman Rawson President Hamilton U. C. Conference

At the first session of the 1953 Hamilton Conference of the United Church of Canada, held at McMaster University on Wednesday, June 3rd, the Rev. Norman Rawson, popular minister of the Centenary United Church, Hamilton was elected president in succession to the Rev. Dr. E. M. Aitken of First United.

In acknowledging his Induction to the president's chair, Mr. Rawson said: "I have found the fellowship of the Conference in proportion to the amount, of myself I gave to sharing in its work."
