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Establish Planning Board Regulate Esqueing Township Expansion

On May 4th, the Council of the Township of Esqueing passed a by-law setting up a Planning Board, composed of Reeve George Leslie, Deputy-Reeve Wilfrid Bird, Lt.-Col. G. O. Brown, Mr. Edwin Harrop and George Somerville.

The Board held their inaugural meeting in the Council Chamber at Stewarttown on Wednesday evening, June 3rd, when G. O. Brown was appointed chairman, Edwin Harrop, vice chairman, and K. C. Lindsay, secretary. Five deeds were approved for registration.

The purpose of the Board is not to prevent or interfere with the sale of property in the township, but rather to assist property owners who are selling lots off their property, to plan the shape and size of lots and provide for roads or streets which might be necessary in the future, in such a way that future trouble and embarrassment will be avoided as far as possible.

Briefly the provisions of the by-law are as follows: Anyone selling 10 acres or more in one block, may do so without reference to the Board. When an owner wishes to sell a piece of land of less than ten acres off his property, he must first get the approval of the Board before the deed can be registered unless (1) the lot is in a registered plan of subdivision or (2) is all that remains to him of a property described in one deed of conveyance, or (3) has been conveyed in the past by a registered deed of conveyance. Also excepted from the provisions of the by-law are the villages of Glen Williams, Norval, Limehouse, and Stewarttown.

Norman Rawson President Hamilton U. C. Conference

At the first session of the 1953 Hamilton Conference of the United Church of Canada, held at McMaster University on Wednesday, June 3rd, the Rev. Norman Rawson, popular minister of the Centenary United Church, Hamilton was elected president in succession to the Rev. Dr. E. M. Aiken of First United.

In acknowledging his induction to the president's chair, Mr. Rawson said: "I have found the fellowship of the Conference in proportion to the amount of myself I gave to sharing in its work." He proceeded to take the Conference back to 1910 when a boy of sixteen went to Sheguandah to preach and was taken for a first fishing trip by Mr. Stevens of that town, who was now today, 1953, a delegate present to see the lad installed as president of Conference.

His first sermon as a sixteen-year-old student contained everything he knew, but that must have been something because the little church at Green Bay was crowded out the following Sunday. The congregation soon realized that he was just a boy with but little resources so they proceeded to supply him with sermons by the great masters of the pulpit — and he improved on them. He improved enough to follow through into the ministry, and now as newly elected president of Conference, he desired publicly to acknowledge his indebtedness to Manitoulin. It was the tolerance, love and understanding of an immature boy by the people of that island that had made his ministry possible.

After his formal induction Mr. Rawson created a new precedent by requesting leave of the Conference to invite Mrs. Rawson, "Maisie," to come to the rostrum to be received by the Conference with him. Mr. Rawson's symbolic act of acknowledgement of what both ministers and churches owe to the partners who share the manse and the leadership of church was received with acclaim. It was particularly fitting in that Mrs. Rawson is this year president of the Hamilton Minister's Wives Association. Mr. Rawson also informed Conference that he intended to urge a return to the pre-war custom of Conference Sunday. For the next Conference laymen would be requested to supply their own pulpits over Conference week-end in
