Sybil on Platform Drew Opens Campaign

Sybil Bennett, Halton's Progressive Conservative candidate in the coming federal election, was one of those on the platform with P.C. leader, Hon. George Drew, Q.C. last Friday night. Miss Bennett preceded Mr. Drew to the platform in the Guelph Armoury before Mr. Drew gave his keynote speech and launched his campaign for the August 10th drive.

To Mr. Drew, it was a triumphal homecoming, before a jammed armory, where some 2,400 hundred people were on hand to welcome him. The armory itself was no strange sight to him, for it was there he joined the army in the first World War, to go overseas, to be commissioned as almost a boy, to rapidly rise to command his battery, and to where he returned, severely wounded, to begin a career in Guelph municipal politics, first as alderman, and later to become city mayor where he later launched his career in provincial politics that led him to lead the P.C. party in three successful campaigns in this province. It was there too, he was married, and where his two children received their early schooling, before he opened his law practice in Toronto. To Mr. Drew there must have been many fond memories as he chatted with old comrades, and with others who had supported him in so many ways. Miss Bennett was one of some thirty candidates who were on the platform. Hon. Tom Kennedy, no stranger to Halton or Georgetown, introduced Mr. Drew. Also present was Miss Margaret Aitken, Toronto ace newspaper reporter, who is running as a P.-C. candidate in Toronto, and who will be in Georgetown in the near future. She just recently returned from the Coronation, which she covered as a reporter.

At the end of the rally, Mr. Drew met old and new friends from Halton who had journeyed over to Guelph to the rally. District people included some from Acton, Norval, Limehouse, and Georgetown.

Unfortunately, in the pictures taken by both the Toronto papers, Miss Bennett, although her hat and arm are visible, was almost totally obscured by one of the pipers who led them to the platform.
