TWILIGHT WEED MEET IS WELL ATTENDED

The first weed meeting of its kind ever held in Halton was staged on Friday evening at the farm of Medforth Pewtress in Trafalgar Township. Despite unfavorable weather conditions, some sixty were on hand for the excellent programme. Stanley Young, fieldman for the Crops, Seeds & Weeds branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture, was the special speaker. Certainly it was a programme which anyone interested in weed control could ill afford to miss.

In the county of Halton, weeds are costing hundreds of thousands of dollars annually. Municipal authorities in the county in many cases are spending anywhere from \$1500 to \$2,000 annually on roadside spraying. Some are doing an excellent. job and others quite the reverse. It would seem logical to us that in the future when such a meeting is being held, that township and county authorities might well see to it, that those charged with the responsibilitiy of controlling roadside weeds are in attendance. Chemical weed killers mark one of the greatest advances in agricultural science of the past ten years. However it is very obvious as one goes about the county that there is a tremendous difference in the results being secured. In short \$15.00 per mile in some municipalities is giving much better control or results than \$30.00 per mile in others.


