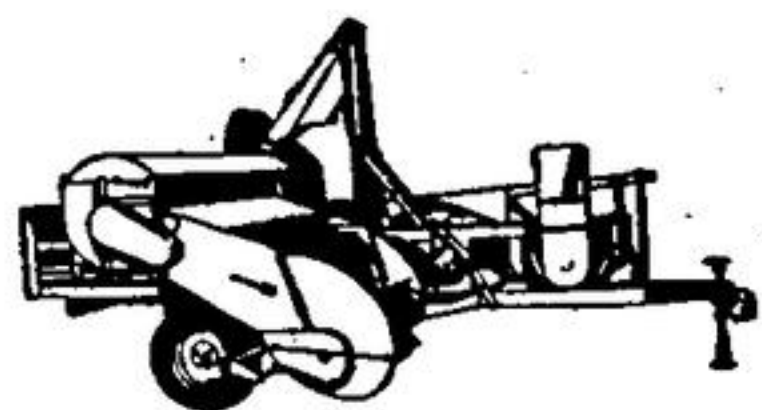
Jim Kirkwood is assisting at the Georgetown Boy Scout Camp held at Everton this week.
