Mabel Laura Lush, wife of Peter D. Hartley died at her home, King Street, Milton, on Monday, June 22nd.

Born in Erasosa in 1874, the daughter of Thomas Foster and Margaret Jane Lush. She lived in Huntsville the early part of her life, then in the Milton community, where she attended Milton and Bell's Schools. In 1892, sixty-one years ago, she married Peter D. Hartley and lived on their farm, Con. 5, Lot 12, Nelson Township, until 1944, when they moved to Milton.

Mrs. Hartley was a life-long member of St. Paul's United Church, a member of the Woman's Missionary Society, and the Women's Association of the church and a charter member of Mountain Union Women's Institute. During her long, busy life, she was always interested in her home and family duties, especially food and flowers, and was ever willing to share her time and give of her best to others.

Surviving are her husband and four daughters, Cora Pearl, Mrs. N. C. Wigglesworth; Marjorie Jean Mrs. R. Anderson; Ellen, Mrs. E. M. Readhead; and Lillian Estelle, Mrs. A. B. First Ontario Dairy Day Proves a Marked Success

Illustrating in marked degree the importance of the dairy industry in the economy of the province, some 8,000 Ontario farmers joined hands with the Ontario Department of Agriculture on Wednesday, June 17th, when Ontario's first "Dairy Day" was celebrated.

From early in the morning until late in the afternoon Ontario farmers from as far east as Ottawa and as far north as Parry Sound, converged on the farm of Mervin Shantz, near Alma, where with Western and central Ontario farmers, they were able to witness the latest developments in all branches of the dairy industry.

Particular interest was evinced in the pole loafing barn located on the Shantz farm as well as the operation of the milking parlour and the barn drying of hay. In addition the latest developments in forage cropping were demonstrated and the programme also included lectures on milk testing and quality production.

David Pelletterio, Milton, and Mildred Parkinson, Hillsburg, were selected as Ontario's first "Dairy Man" and "Dairy Maid." Each county Junior Farmer Association was invited to nominate a candidate for each title. Halton Juniors under the leadership of president Harold Tyrrell, nominated Dave Pelletterio of Palermo Juniors, and Barbara Cunningham of Norval Juniors. Along with the honoree Dave and Mildred each received fifty dollar cheques.
