As the general election approaches many details of the respective policies of the various political parties will be presented to the voters' attention. Close consideration of these policies is warranted and, through the facilities offered by this paper, it will be my privilege to discuss some of the feature points with you as the campaign progresses. But I would like to use the space made available to me this week to provide all residents of this county with information about the Liberal candidate seeking their support.

FIRST POLITICAL CAMPAIGN

This is my first venture into federal politics and it is quite natural to assume that Murray McPhail is unknown to many electors in Halton county. LIFE LONG RESIDENT

My home has always been in Halton County. My father spent his life in Halton and my grandparents settled here after immigrating from Scotland. A farm site, near the village of Campbellville in Nassagaweya Township, attracted these pioneers upon arrival. And although my wife and I and our two children now reside in Campbellville, the original homestead remains in the family name.

The greater part of my adult life has been spent in active operation of my home farm. But six years ago a business opportunity proved sufficiently attractive to cause partial severance of my farming connection and to take me into a new career in the business world. On September 1, 1946, I became secretary-manager of the Ontario Retail Feed Dealers' Association. In this work, I visit all sections of Ontario and other provinces in addition to certain areas of the U.S. It is my honest opinion that the experience I have gained in representing a trade organization of more than 350 business people cannot be otherwise than helpful in serving you as a member of parliament.

However, with this brief outline of my background, no attempt is being made to create the impression that I consider myself capable of immediately providing the type and quality of service that I believe is required by my country. Experience, training, study, and perseverance are just as essential in political work as in any other business undertaking before maximum results can be obtained. I am, therefore, prepared to devote all my energy toward rapidly becoming the responsible representative that this county requires — and that you can continue to support.

REALIZES RESPONSIBILITY

It will be readily understood that no one decides to attempt a public career without very carefully considering all aspects of the undertaking. I recognize and accept the fact that there will be a constant demand for service to all constituents and that there will be personal sacrifices which are not separated from this or any other path of service.
