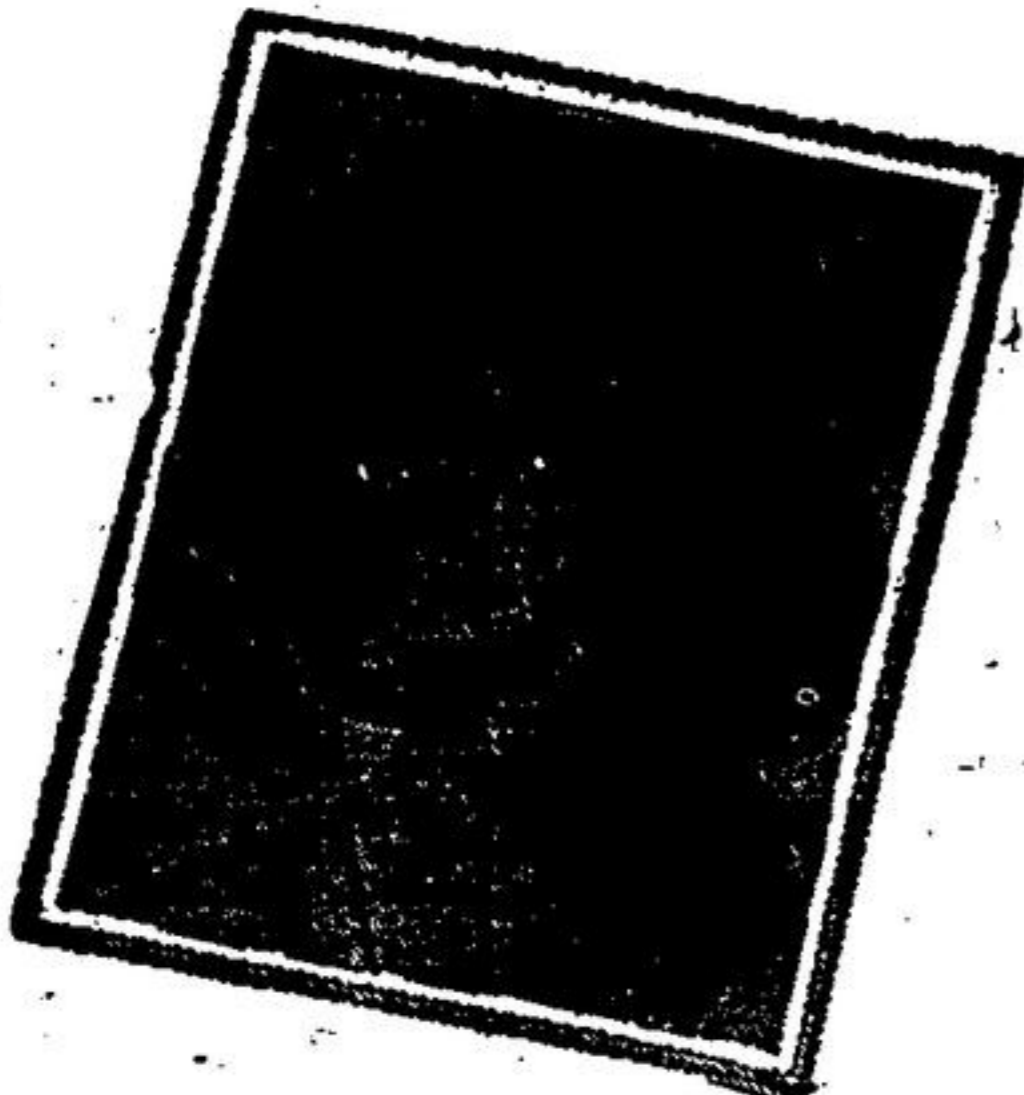

On Sunday, June 14th, the United Church, Norval, celebrated its sixty-fourth anniversary in the present building. The Rev. George A. Little, D.D., former editor of Sunday School publications preached both morning and evening. The Minister Rev. C. C. Gilbert conducted the services.

Special music in the morning included a solo by Mrs. Jean May, "The Penitent" by Van DeWater, an anthem "Give Me A Perfect Heart" by A. Wooler; a male quartette "Remember Me O Mighty One" by Messrs. Clark Lyons, Gordon Graham, Wm. Laidlaw and Garnet Laidlaw. A Ladies Triple Trio unaccompanied, "The Lord's My Shepherd" by Mr. E. Shildrick of Toronto, who was present at the service. First soprano, Mrs. Clark Lyons, Miss Jean McLaughlin, Miss Marilyn Cleave; Second Soprano, Mrs. Glenn Laidlaw, Mrs. Wm. Laidlaw, Miss Patricia Carney; Contralto, Mrs. Jean May, Mrs. Lloyd Laidlaw, Miss Marion Pomeroy. The morning congregation overflowed to aisles and stairways. Dr. Little's morning message "The Hand that Guides" was most inspiring. A full congregation returned for the evening service when Dr. Little spoke on "The Impact on Christ's Life" a spiritual challenge and a heart-warming one. Special music for the evening included "The Holy City" sung by Mrs. Glenn Laidlaw, an anthem "Come Unto Me" by E. R. Bowles; a Mixed Quartette "Face to Face" sung by Mrs. Clark Lyons, Mr. Clark Lyons, Mrs. Jean May and Wm. Laidlaw. The Ladies Triple Trio was repeated in response to numerous requests.

The bulletins for the order of services illustrated the day's theme. A miniature of Jesus leading His sheep and a full front cover quotation of the 23rd Psalm in coloured Old-English Type. The day's services left one inspired, challenged enriched.

The new Hallman electric organ was used and the young organists Misses Ruth Wilson and Elaine Laird displayed excellent talent in both accompaniment and solo work.

**"PEACE" SERMON SERIES  
ENDS AT ST. JOHN'S**

The last few Sundays at St. John's United Church Rev. John M. Smith's meditations have been on the subject of peace, showing how it has been the great desire of the peoples of the world, in spite of all the wars, as far back as records go, and is just as much so in our time. And though it has been continuously wished for and sought after, there is still no peace. Neither wars to end war, nor appeasement, have so far been able to bring it about.

In summing up last Sunday morning, Mr. Smith took for his text the words of Jesus, "This is my commandment: That ye love one another as I have loved you." He stressed the fact that to attain peace all experience and evidence calls for a greater trial and practise of the Jesus way of living, a closer following and understanding of His teaching about the meaning of love and true all-embracing peace. In becoming followers of Jesus, Christians commit themselves to Jesus' way, and in so doing, get a new conception of life, a new motive for living, and with that a new commitment of responsibility for all the peoples of the earth, all the nations, because they all come under the Fatherhood of God their Creator, and it is the Christian's duty or commitment to obey the commandment of his or her chosen leader to "love one another as I have loved you" and to bring them to a knowledge of God's love and care. As we increasingly take this commitment seriously, and increasingly practise world brotherhood in this spirit, so are we increasing our chances of world peace.

Mr. Smith mentioned two of the greatest parables of Jesus; that of the Good Samaritan and the Prodigal Son. Each described an individual incident but the lesson in each was universal. Though it was a man that was bruised and beaten and needed the help of the Good Samaritan was able to give and did give, the lesson applies to a nation bruised and beaten by oppression, tyranny, war or famine, and Jesus' commendation goes to those who do not pass by on the other side but give the help they can. Remember other words of Jesus: "I was hungry and ye gave me meat, sick and ye ministered unto me, in prison and ye visited me." Will He not add: "Inasmuch as ye did it unto one of the least of these my nations, ye did it unto me?" And though the prodigal was a younger son who would not listen to his father's entreaty but spent all he could get on himself, and wasted his Father's substance, still the father loved him. So does God still love the wayward nations and is waiting and watching

for them to come home.

And in words of the text, Jesus is counting on our love for them, as He has loved us, to help bring them home, and the world into peace.

We quote the words of Patience Strong in "Loving Life":  
"If you love God, you will love life, for God is life.

Loving life does not mean loving what it gives in the way of worldly pleasures and worldly goods, it means loving life for its own sake. You love the world because it is God's world.

The beauty of nature is His garment.

The stars are His jewels.  
The flowers and trees are His creations.

The light of the sun is a token of His presence."
