Honour Miss Preston For Lily Research

World famous for her experimental work with hybrid lilies, Miss Isabella Preston of Georgetown will be honoured at a testimonial dinner in Hamilton next week.

The dinner will be a feature of the 6th annual show of the North American Lily Society, which will take place for two days, Friday and Saturday at the Royal Connaught Hotel. The luncheon on Friday is in recognition of Miss Preston's valuable work while she was a staff member of the Experimental Farm at Ottawa. Many of the hybrid lilies she has developed will be on view at the show. Flowers are expected to be flown in from as far away as Oregon and Virginia, and possibly from England.

Informal House Meetings CCF Campaign Strategy

Stan Allen, the CCF candidate for Halton County, in speaking to an informal meeting at Oakville said, "The Liberals say that they are the only party that can form a stable government. Soccer Interest Growing 300 See Guelph Play

In spite of bad weather approximately 300 spectators were at the park on Dominion Day, to see an exciting soccer match between Georgetown Wolves and a team from Guelph.

Guelph were a polished team and their ball control was a pleasure to see; the Georgetown team (which is showing promise of making a really first class side), made a good showing and at times gave the impression of a team of greater maturity than actually is the case, this being only their second match.

The game started at 7 o'clock with each team probing the defence of the other. After about 5 minutes the Guelph forwards found an opening and in a beautiful move Barton (centre forward) gathered the ball in the centre and drove it between the posts putting Guelph in the lead.

After this Georgetown battled furiously in the Guelph half but to no avail, again the Guelph forwards broke away, and swinging the ball wing to wing and then to the centre gave Barton (who was a menace every time he got the ball) another opportunity — he gathered the ball and without hesitation shot it for another goal.

After this the Wolves really got moving and gave Guelph a lot of hard work in defence. The local boys certainly were pushing for goals and very soon a wonderfully concerted move brought the forwards to the Guelph goalmouth and seizing the opportunity L. Nolan drove in a shot which completely beat the Guelph goalkeeper, giving the Wolves their only goal of the match. The rest of the first half was a ding dong struggle in which Guelph gained another goal.

The second half opened with the threat of rain becoming very real and kept the crowd running to and from the trees for shelter. The Wolves were attacking from the word go and it was at this time they showed the promise of making a team for Georgetown to be proud of. The team spirit, the swinging of the ball from player to player, was really good. They just lacked the ability to convert the attack into goals. This ability can only come, of course, with greater experience.

The game had to be curtailed 15 minutes before time because of heavy rain, the result at that time was Guelph 5 — Georgetown Wolves 1.

The next match of the Wolves is at Acton with the newly-formed Acton team next Friday, July 10th, at 7 o'clock and many teams from nearby towns will be coming to Georgetown in the near future.

The new teams being formed everywhere is a very heartening sign of the solid advance of soccer in the realms of Canadian sport and the Georgetown boys really mean to see that Georgetown will be in the forefront of this advance.
