Before enunciating and introducing this program to the people of this country every point was fully considered, studied and weighed in the light of our present national and international commitments for performance. In the matter of tax reduction alone there can be a sav-. ing of half a billion dollars yearly and still take care of our present defence, social security programs and those increases which will be called for by the proposals we have made for the improvement of the different Government services by an lying sound business methods, by ending waste and extravagance, losses and inefficiency which have been reported by every independent enquiry of which Parliament has been permitted to see the report.

There can be no reduction of taxes, however, by the return of a Government to office which spends \$13,500 for every day of the year, including Sunday, for telephones and telegrams in the Defence Department alone, which spends \$10,000,000 a year on publicity and \$28,000,000 for professional and special services when most of these services could be performed by the highly qualified and trained civil servants which this country has at its disposal.
