### NEW TUNES

Certain professional politicians are so intent on "plugging" new tunes these days, and are so pleased with the publicity, they never pause to consider the significance of the words. Or how they sound to responsible citizens. One of the most popular Tory tunes is about "half a billion off the budget" — a platform number that George Drew's candidates are chanting a chorus from coast to coast, like happy children who have just learned the words of a new song. And the words are new. There can be little doubt of that. Mr. Drew has graced Ottawa for some time now, but apparently wasn't inspired until he could stand in the spotlight of campaign platforms. Stage appearances and campaign headlines generally prove more stimulating and inspiring to Mr. Drew than the atmosphere of critical appraisal supplied by parliament. Actually, "half a billion off the budget" has a pleasant sound to it. And it would be excellent campaign material if it could be applied with the same ease that it has been promoted. It seems only reasonable to me that the Liberal party, seeking re-election, would have welcomed any opportunity to make such a reduction — if it had been possible through sound, sane financing. Or, let us say, if it had been good business.

The Liberal government has provided progressive policies and responsible guidance for the Canadian people for several years and is hopeful that this national service merits continuation in office. It is as simple as that. Tories who are fuming in frustration because there is no "new" Liberal platform every four years simply cannot seem to understand that no business, no matter how large or small, can be successfully operated by administrators who try to substitute promises for performance.

The consistently sound performance of the Liberal administration has promoted Canada's progress and prosperity. The Tories now suggest tampering with the nation's economy. They aren't exactly sure how they would propose to do it but half a billion off the budget would look nice.

Any businessman, farmer or housewife in Halton county could tell Mr. Drew or his candidate, Miss Bennett, that no one can casually cut budgets — national, provincial, municipal, industrial or domestic — without some reductions in services, standards of living, social amenities or everyday necessities — unless you ignore your obligations.

A glance south of the border shows what can happen to very sincere efforts to save expenditures. In office, the national budget does not look anything like it did from the outside and despite valiant effort to live up to pre-election promises there is every indication that political pride will bend to national needs.

### A REGARD FOR BUDGETS

The London Statist took a good long look at Canada and gave this explanation of the investors' confidence in this country. It stated: "Canada is favoured because the rulers of Canada have demonstrated in the recent past a regard for balanced budgets, for sound fiscal policies, for enlightened social legislation, for self-discipline in financial administration, and a belief in the right of the investor to receive a just return of his outlay."

The great English journal, The Economist, which is regarded by many as the finest economic magazine in the English language, made these observations: "No boom was ever painless, but the Canadian boom perhaps comes nearest to earning that distinction. Canada is not merely favoured with abundant material sources. It has had the good sense — or the good luck — to provide itself with good government. Its economic affairs have been handled with a skill unexampled throughout the world."

All you need bring is a basket lunch, tea, coffee and milk provided.

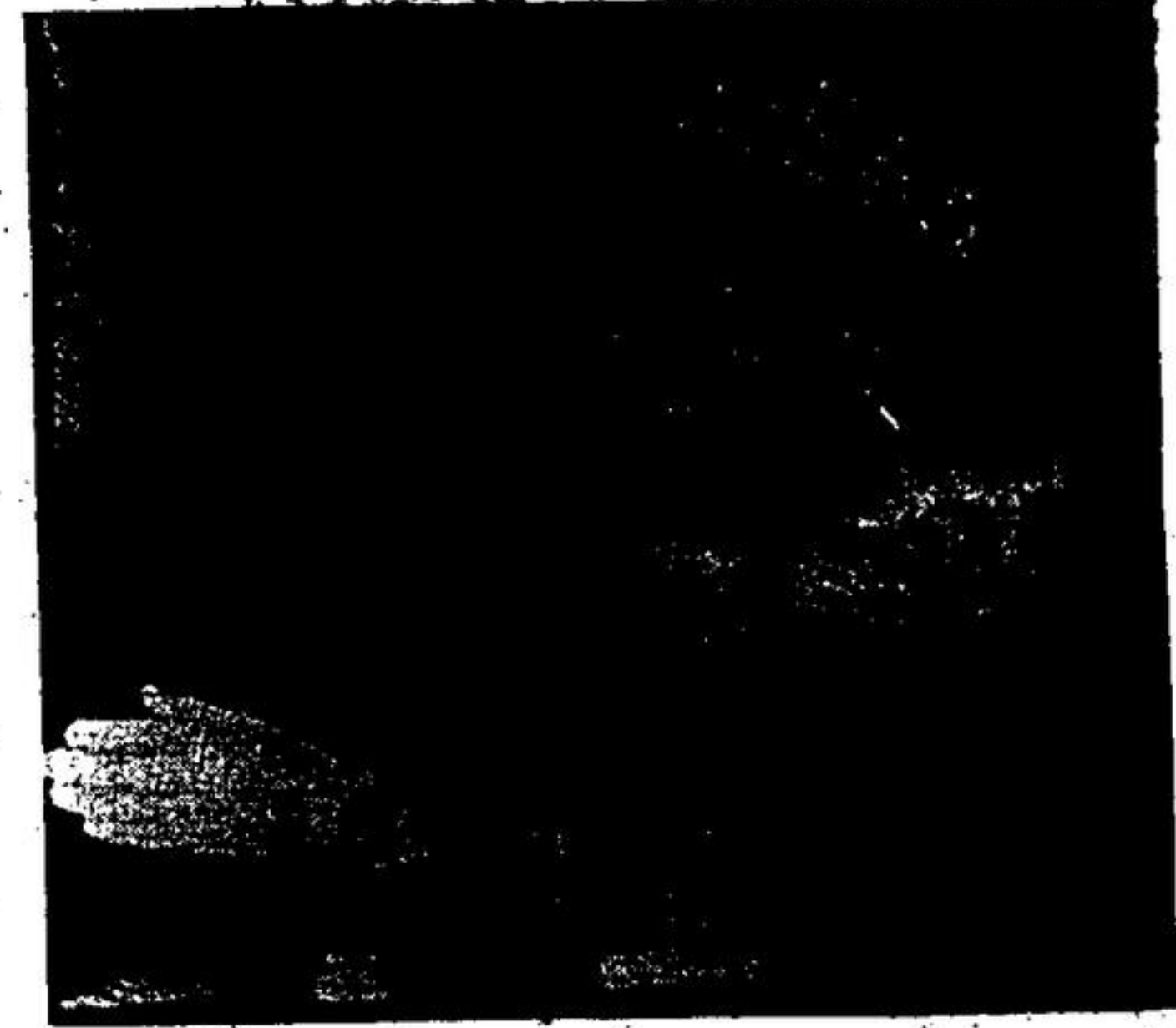
### VISITORS HOME FROM OVERSEAS
