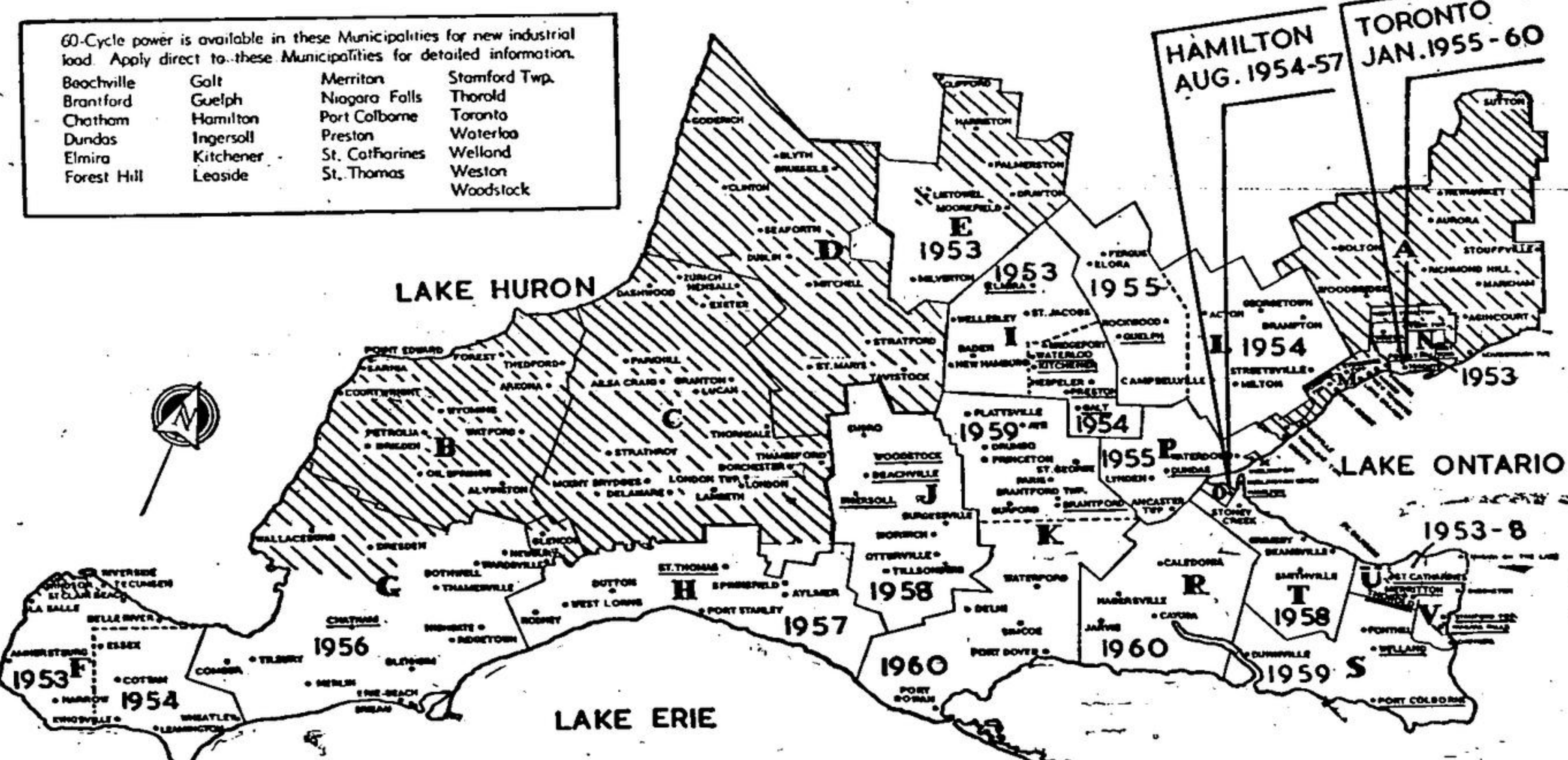
## Mural Dedicated to World Peace Unveiled at U.N.



A huge mural covering a curved wall over 60 feet long and 10 feet high was recently unveiled at United Nations Headquarters. Painted in tempera directly on a canvas-covered wall by Jose Vela Zanetti, Director of the National School of Fine Arts of the Dominican Republic, it depicts man's eternal struggle for lasting peace. The mural is the gift of the Guggenheim Foundation, under whose fellowship the 39-year old Spanlah-born artist worked. ## TENTATIVE 60-CYCLE CHANGEOVER DATES FOR REMAINING 25-CYCLE SOUTHERN ONTARIO AREAS

(Shaded Portions Indicate Areas Already Standardized)



Map indicates Ontario Hydro's TENTATIVE SCHEDULE for dates of changeover in remaining 25-cycle Southern Ontario areas. Standardization work was completed recently in the city of Windsor, and in the Township of North York. It is now in progress in a section of Essex County, and in York Township, and is nearing completion in Area "E" — the Listowel-Palmerston district. General changeover in the city of Toronto is expected to start early in 1955. All dates shown are TENTATIVE and subject to change at any time should conditions warrant.

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
