

60 Cycle Power for Georgetown Next June

Georgetown power will be converted to 60 cycle during the second and third weeks in June next year.

Announcing dates for the changeover in Georgetown and surrounding territory, chairman Robert H. Saunders of the Ontario Hydro Commission states that 1300 domestic customers and 175 commercial are on the books for conversion during these two weeks.

Brampton Rural Hydro, which services the countryside around town and has 3910 domestic and 325 commercial users, will be next on the list, with some of this area converted during the following two weeks and the balance following in September and October.

These districts, with Brampton, Acton, Milton, Campbellville and Streetsville form part of hydro's standardization area "L" comprising an 888 square mile section in the counties of Halton, Peel and South Wellington.

Other changeover dates are: Acton: second and third weeks July; Brampton, last week July, 3rd and 4th weeks August; Milton, last two weeks September; Campbellville, second week October; Streetsville, third week October.

It is anticipated that for the 9,930 domestic customers in these municipalities some 40,000 appliances will have to be changed over. These will include an estimated 10,000 washing machines, 6,000 refrigerators and nearly 4,000 record players. In addition, it is expected that more than 6,500 clocks and 2,000 fans will either be standardized or exchanged for new 60-cycle models.

Chairman Saunders says inventories are now being taken of the frequency-sensitive equipment owned by power customers as nearly a year is needed to engineer and order the necessary motors and replacement parts used by industrial plants.

Some four to five months before changeover, domestic and commercial customers are visited by Hydro personnel, who take listings of customers' frequency-sensitive appliances.

Also forming part of area "L" are Guelph, Fergus, Elora, Rockwood and surrounding districts. Changeover times for these municipalities will be announced at a later date.

A 60-cycle transformer station is to be built at a cost of \$1,592,000 three miles west of Brampton, which will double the service to Brampton, Georgetown, Acton and Streetsville.

The Cooksville Transformer Station will be dismantled on completion of the Brampton station, which is scheduled for the summer of 1954.

Chairman Saunders adds that although standardization of Hydro's area "P"—Waterdown, Dundas, Lynden, Ancaster and surrounding rural operating areas—is tentatively scheduled to take place in 1955, consideration is now being given to changing over, late in 1954, the equipment of customers of the Wa-

terdown Public Utilities Commission and of the Burlington Rural Operating Area.

Harris fired three for the Indians. Jacobs and Winnie two apiece with singles going to Thomas, Skye and R. Martin.

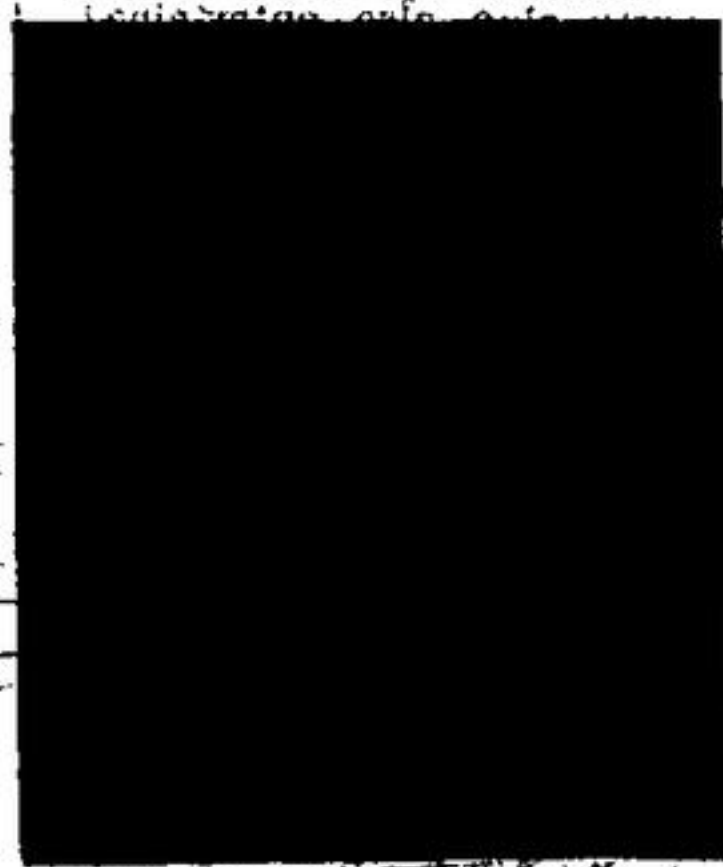

BROKEN INSULATOR CAUSES POWER CUT-OFF MONDAY

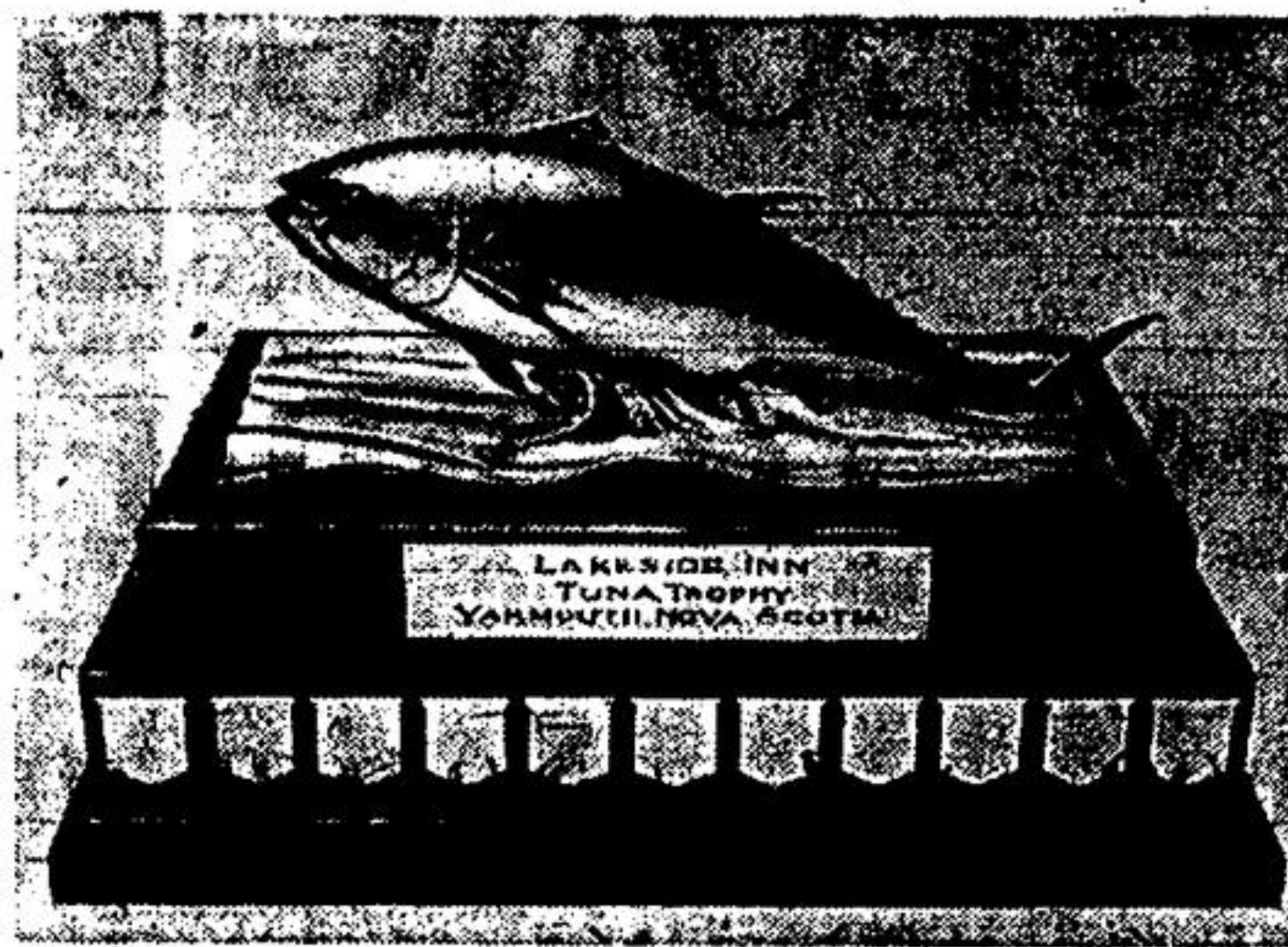

One of the most beautiful trophies ever put up for competition in Canada will add even more spice to the thrill of hooking into a giant bluefin tuna in the famous big-game fishing waters off the coast of Nova Scotia. Known as the "Lakeside Inn Tuna Trophy" the silver masterpiece stands more than 20" high and depicts one of the battling bluefins breaking the surface and will be awarded annually to the contestant entering the largest catch.

To be competed for by guests of the Lakeside Inn, a Canadian Pacific Railway summer resort at Yarmouth, N.S., the trophy is to be kept at the Inn and the winner's name will be inscribed annually on a shield to be placed on the trophy.

This is the first year that the competition has been held, but it will be open each year during the period that the Lakeside Inn is in operation—usually from the last week of June to mid-September. All entries must be in by October 1 and a winner will be declared on Oct. 15. Other conditions governing the competition are that entries must be sealed and deposited with the manager of the Lakeside Inn, or declaration forms supplied for the purpose, within 15 days from the date that the tuna was caught.
