Kew Pertable Device Measures Atomic Results

A new type army, signal corps portable radiac set used in detecting and measuring the effects of atomic explosions, has been chosen as the official instrument to be used by federal and state civil defense teams according to a letter issued by James J. Wadsworth, federal civil defense administration, to state governors throughout the country. The set, designated the AN/PDR-T-I for "portable detector radiac." was developed and designed to conform to signal corps specifications by the nucleonics branch of the Evans signal laboratory, one of three divisions of the signal corps engineering laboratories located at this post. In choosing the signal corps set, the letter stated, preference was given by a special civil defense radiological committee to those sets which "can be readily maintained, and will perform satisfactory under operating conditions which might be encountered in civil defense." Among agencies represented on the radiological committee were the atomic energy commission, the armed forces special weapons project of the department of defense, the United States public health service, the bureau of standards and the federal civil defense administration. Three requirements met by the signal corps set, the letter continued, were military specifications, suitability for immediate training and usefulness for low-intesity civil defense monitoring work.

Columbus' Followers Found Peanut Crop

Spanish adventurers following in Columbus' wake found peanuts growing in South America-saw 16th century Peruvians roasting them, grinding them into butter and making confections, just as we do in the United States today. Thus it was that gold, silver and spices shared with "ground outs"-novelty of the strange new world- space in the wind and wave tossed galleons struggling homeward. In sunny Spain they grew, four shed, became known as "Spanish" peanuts. Peahuts were carried along when the quest for rare metals, spices and ivory turned to Africa. Again they flourished, acquired a new name, "goobers." African dialect for ground nut. Finally they came here, this time in lumbering ships close packed with slaves, as food-the cheapest obtainable for human freight. Once planted in the south, peanut growing spread. So peanuts became a marketable commodity and Union soldiers, liking them, carried them north, where their popularity has never vaned. The little brown nut was first cultivated in Virginia and North Carolina but gradually peanut growing pushed its way south. Today thirteen states in the south and southwest comprise the peanut belt, from where pear nuts are shipped to every corner of our country.

Advance of Civilization

Some time ago Professor Daniel W. Hering, then of New York University, maintained that the railroads have had a great deal to do with the advance of civilization because they made people more time conscious, especially those who lived in rural sections. The way he explains it, during the days of early railroading most family clocks varied a great deal, sometimes as much as an hour. People governed their activities as much by the position of the sun as by the inaccurate clocks. But the advent of railroads changed all this because they operated on strict schedules that didn't vary more than a minute one way or another. Family timepieces were demanded that would allow trains to be caught on time, and soon people were regulating their movements by minutes instead of hours. The Swiss have reason to bless the railroads, for this development gave the watch-making industry the greatest shot in the arm it has ever

What's That Again?

From the beginning of autumn, on Sept. 23, to the beginning of spring on March 21 is 179 days, but from the latter to the beginning of autumn is 185 days. Why is this? The neurer a planet is to the sun, the faster it travels in its orbit, measured in miles per hour: Because the earth is about 3,000,000 miles nearer the sun in early Janpary than in early July, or orbital speed is greater during autumn and winter than in spring, and summer. Hence, the time from the beginning of autumn to the beginning of spring is about six days shorter than that from the first day of spring to the end of summer.

Faithful Fido Many instances of dogs waiting around railroad stations for the return of their masters have been noted. Some dogs have kept faithful watch for months, leaving their post only long enough to obtain food. One instance of this occurred some time ago in Japan, at the Shibuya station in Tokyo. This exhibtion of faithfulness so impressed the Japanese that they built a statue of the waiting dog. In addition, thousands of miniatures of the statue were made and distributed to every school in Japan as a symbol of faithfulness for the small fry


