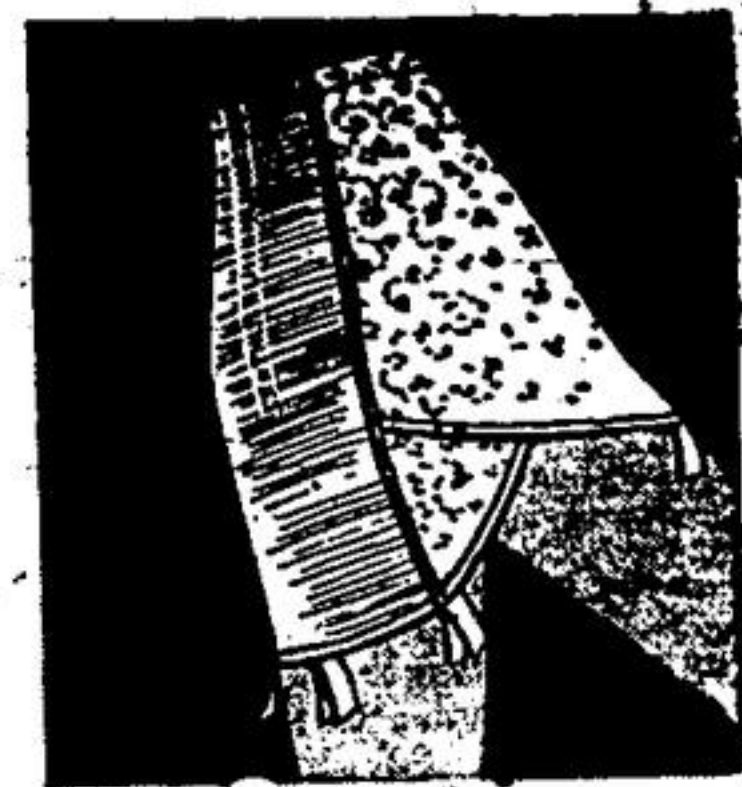

DREW VISITS HALTON

pound barrier now hampering trade with the UK could be broken if it were approached in a sensible businesslike way. Mr. Drew said that was based on expert opinions on both sides of the Atlantic. As further proof of this, he noted the incongruity of conflicting statements made by Lester Pearson, who said that the problem was being tackled, only to be contradicted by Mr. St. Laurent a few days later, who said that it was impossible. Mr. Drew too, spoke of the income tax exemptions possible if a PC government were elected and cited the ways that the various municipalities could be helped by a federal government. He spoke feelingly of his pleasure at having two old friends on the platform with him — one of his oldest and dearest friends, Tom Kennedy, and Stan Hall, who he had come to like and respect so much during their associations in the Ontario government. Mr. Drew laughingly recalled the time 10 years ago, when a Liberal government in Ontario had called an election under much the same circumstances in this province, and as he laughingly put it, the Conservatives "hadn't fared too badly in that one at all."

Mr. Drew called on all present to get out and work, support, and vote for Sybil Bennett. He cited her many qualities and abilities, saying it was high time more women were in the House of Commons, and citing that there were many reasons for this, their interest in education, social services, etc., and laughingly remarked that he hoped Halton would send Sybil to Ottawa, for, among other reasons, to practice that particular woman's specialty house-cleaning. "For if ever a place needed a house cleaning, it's the House of Commons."

Miss Bennett then spoke, thanking all those who had come at this very inconvenient hour to hear the P-C leader. She spoke solemnly of the great future of Halton County, and the great decisions that lay in the future, and of her hope that she might be allowed to serve her county, and pledged any abilities she might possess, to the task. Miss Bennett then noted the fact that in the past few weeks the Liberals had brought into Halton every top ranking member of the Liberal hierarchy had spoken... that they all had one thing in common, that not one had spoken of the future or Liberal plans for the future but rather had harked back to that age-old cry that a Conservative government would cut social services and that under any government but the Liberals there would be depression. This in spite of the overwhelming evidence that the last one had been world wide, and that, after all, a Liberal government had been in power for the first two years of it and had done absolutely nothing to combat it, and in the face of the facts that the Conservative party was solemnly pledged to carry on all social services and to extend them. Miss Bennett flayed the waste and extravagance of the present administration pledging a return to sane, representative government by a Conservative government after August 10th. She ended with the hope that everyone would support her regardless of political affiliation, and promised to serve Halton to the very best of her ability. Chairman Allan Nicholson closed the meeting with God Save the Queen.
