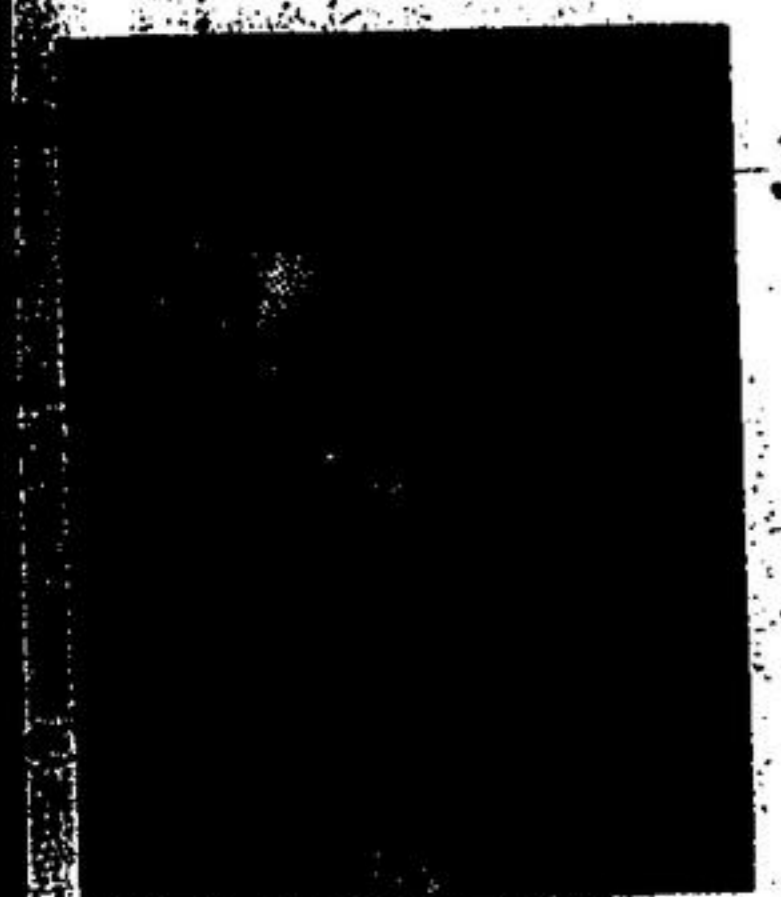

Today, I'd like to talk about Democracy — a most precious heritage which thousands of young Canadians have defended with their very lives. Democracy — a government of the people, by the people, and for the people, is how Abraham Lincoln once aptly put it. Democracy — as we Canadians envision it — is a government at Ottawa consisting of a prime minister and a cabinet who not only believe, but who carry out that belief that they have no rights and can exercise no powers beyond those given to them by the members of the House of Commons (your elected representatives) who have a full knowledge of all the essential facts!

This — and only this — is true government of the people and by the people!

Under the St. Laurent Government of today, the authority and power of parliament have sunk to its lowest level in our history. One newspaper man puts it this way: "Veteran observers of parliament feel that its power and prestige have slipped a long way over the last few years. They cite various reasons — the Government's huge majority (184 seats against 48 of the Progressive Conservatives and 71 of the three opposition parties combined); its lavish use of Orders-in-Council during and after the war; the fact that only one Cabinet member (Hon. Alphonse Fournier) has ever sat in opposition — most of all, its 18 years of power — with unlimited money to spend during all that time."

What a far cry this is from the day in 1930 when the late W. L. Mackenzie King laid down the liberal policy on this matter:

"The business of this country should be carried on in the open on the Floor of this Parliament in such a manner that the Government will be obliged to take into their confidence not only the Members of Parliament, but the people of the country whose money they are voting to expend."

How far the Liberal Party has departed from its pledges and principles is best shown by this striking and emphatic condemnation voiced by Hon. C. G. Power, MP, Liberal ex-minister of air:

"The traditional party of progress and reform has gone off the track and is travelling in the ditches of expediency and improvisation, first right, then left. What it requires is a rebirth and resurgence of liberalism and a clear restatement of its principles... From what does it require saving? From Opportunism at the neglect of Principle... this "neglect of principle," Mr. Power continues, is an ailment begotten of what can only be called "Office-Holding Mania."

Lionel Chevrier, greeted this attempt with:

"Who wants to hear YOU?"

Said Mr. Howe:

"Who would stop us? Don't take yourself too seriously. If we wanted to get away with it — who would stop us?"

of J. R. Henderson, Kingston and Macdonald College, Quebec. The Belmont conference was sponsored by the Elgin County Holstein Club, whose members supplied the cattle used for discussion purposes. Elsewhere the home herd supplied demonstration classes of excellent quality.

The attendance at each conference was purposely kept small so that free and frank discussion would take place. Some 25 to 35 were on hand at each event.

The objects of the conference were to promote uniformity in judging and handling cattle in the ring and to serve as a refresher course at which judges could "get their eye in" before the start of the show season.

A panel consisting of Prof. Geo. E. Raithby of the OAC and D. S. Dunton, Brampton, led the discussions at all of the conferences. E. A. Innes, Brantford was added to this panel at Belmont and Rosafe while Prof. A. R. Ness of Macdonald College and W. A. Hodge, Mount Royal, Que., were included in the panel at Macdonald College. G. M. Clemens, secretary of the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada acted as chairman of the four Ontario meetings, while Hermas Lajoie, Montreal, was chairman of the Macdonald College Conference.

The conferences in Ontario were sponsored by the Ontario Branch of the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada while that at Quebec was under the sponsorship of the Quebec Branch. The advisability of holding such gatherings had previously been recommended by the National Extension Service Committee of the Association.
