He was buried in Lakewood Park Cemetery after the funeral service on Friday in the Klanke Funeral Parlors, Lakewood.

CCF Has Informal Burlington Meeting

INTERESTS SAME FOR FARMERS, WORKERS: ALLEN

Stanley Allen, the CCF candidate for Halton, met some of the electors of the town of Burlington at a meeting at the home of Mrs. H. Springer, 18 Nelson Ave., on Wednesday, July 22nd.

Mr. Allen chatted informally with visitors, answering their questions about the Co-Operative Commonwealth Federation, and outlining CCF policy on different subjects.

On Monday of the same week, Stan Allen had appeared on the platform with M. J. Caldwell in Hamilton. He said then that the farmers and workers of the country are beginning to realize that their interests are the same. He said that from his contacts with the farmers throughout the county he had noticed an increased interest in the CCF and its program.

Mr. Caldwell reminded his audience that Canada has the distinction of being one of the last three democratic nations of the world to be without a national health plan. The fault, he said, lay directly at the doorstep of the Liberal party. The meeting was reported as the largest purely political meeting that any leader had attracted.

Canadian Holstein Makes Big Record in States

Niholm Baroness Hartog, a pure-bred Holstein bred by Harvey Nigh & Sons, Springfield, Ont. and now owned by Lakefield Farms, Clarks-town, Mich., has recently completed the second highest yearly herd test record ever made in the USA. Started on test as a ten year old, she produced in 365 days on twice-a-day milking a total of 28,898 lbs. milk containing 1140 lbs. fat, average test 4.0 percent butterfat.

"Baroness" has two previous herd test records made in the Lakefield herd, having given 26,041 lbs. milk containing 1005 lbs. fat, as an eight year old and 20,946 lbs. milk containing 684 lbs. fat as a nine year old.

A son of "Baroness" was recently sold to H. Villegas, Palmira, Colombia for \$1825. This was at the National Convention Sale at St. Paul, Minn.

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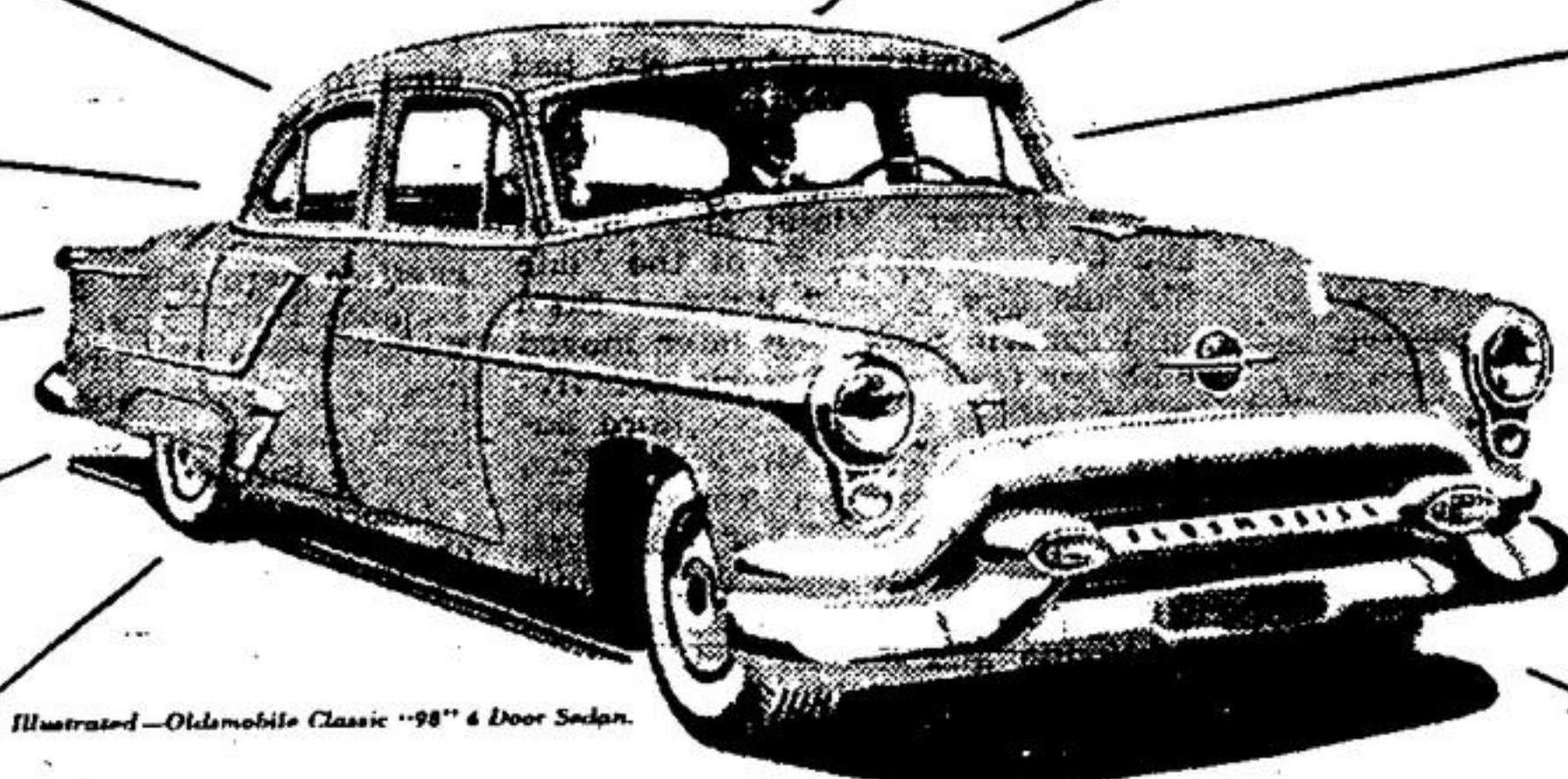

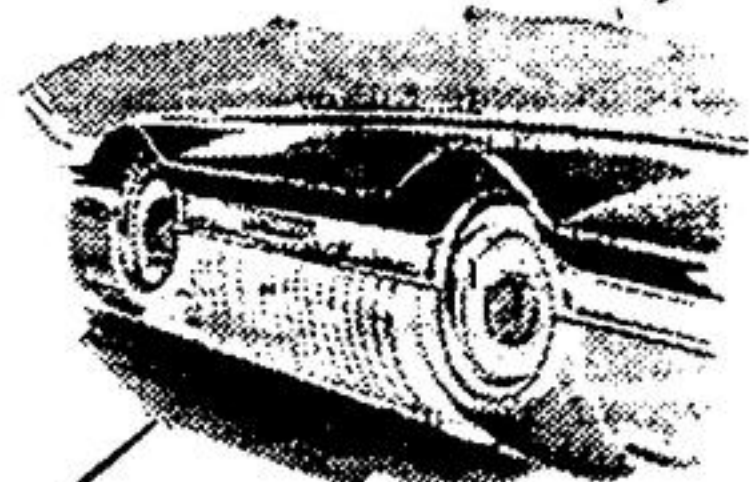


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
