· E. W. Binkley, purchasing agent and supervisor of quality control Mt-Smith & Stone Ltd. for the past seven years has been made plastics division manager.

Mr. Binkley assumed his new position in July and is in charge of the new plant addition which houses this important part of the company's products. Formerly the plastics division was located in the Duplate plant in Osbawa.

Another company man, Robert Stewardson will take over quality control, while Arthur Parry, Toronto, has been engaged as purchasing agent.

Mr. Binkley is a Toronto native whose business experience began with Ontario Hydro, where from 1934 to 1940 he worked with the approvals laboratory. Joining Research Enterprises at Leaside in the early war years, he was for three years assistant chief inspector in the radio division and later technical assistant to the contracts department manager. In 1946, he was administrative assistant to Brigadier F. C. Wallace, now managing director of Smith & Stone, who was at that time director of the radio branch of National Research in Ottawa.

A resident of Valley View Road, Mr. Binkley has retained his interest in hydro affairs, serving several terms as a Georgetown hydro commissioner.

Arthur Parry, the firm's new purchasing agent, is a Toronto man who has previously been employed with the Canadian General Electric Company. He was purchasing supervisor for the radio and television section of that company. Prior to that, Mr. Parry worked with the S. A. Armstrong firm in the city.

He is unmarried. Mr. Stewardson has been with Smith & Stone for five years, and is a resident of Elgin Street. Prevlously with the cathode ray division of Research Enterprises, he was before that an electronics technician with Canadian Pacific Airlines.

A small number of key men will be coming frow Oshawa to the new plant which is already in partial production. All major equipment has arrived and in a few weeks all machinery should be in operation.

The plastics division produces all types of thermoplastic mouldings and extrusions, as well as polythene collapsible containers. About seventy-five, mostly men, will be employed and at present production is on a 24 hour basis, with three shifts working.

A large number of parts for General Motors products are manufactured here, including gear shift knobs, refrigerator trays, car name plates and upholstery welting. Such waried lines as radio cabinets and dial knobs are also in the assembly line. While most of the production is for component parts of other products, some will bear the Smith and Stone label, including a line of gar-Hen hose and air hose.

Seek Debentures for \$11,000 Sidewalks

The Municipal Board will be asked to approve a debenture for new sidewalk construction in Georgetown.

Last night, council gave first and second readings to a by-law which will authorize the issue of debentures for 3330 feet of new sidewalk on Victoria Street, .Victoria Ave., Park Ave., and Queen, Market, Young, and Water Streets. Cost of the sidewalks is estimated at \$11,430.

The by-law is drawn up under the Local Improvement Act but entire cost of the project will be paid by the town and no individual assessments will be made against property owners. All sidewalks planned will replace old pavement

While no discussion took place on the by-law, two of the members voted against the by-law, Councillors McGilvray and Goodlet.

One hundred dollars was voted to the fire brigade for expenses of delegates to the convention in Thorold last week-end.

At the suggestion of Cr. Norton, the highways department will be asked to paint white lines across No. 7 for children crossing to Chapel Street school.

Notification was received that Georgetown's share of county costs this year will be \$21,117, with a 4 per cent discount for payment in December. Budget figure for county costs is \$20,000.
