

## Three Roomed School Planned at Norval

### TEMPORARY ROOM AT RECREATION CENTRE

Growth of the suburban Norval area will be reflected in a new three-room public school which will be ready for occupancy within the next year.

Tenders for the new school were opened at a recent meeting of the board of Esqueing School Area No. 1 which administers the business of this and several other township schools. Successful tenderer is the Georgetown firm of J. B. Mackenzie and Son, which has already contracted to build the new 4-room and the new 7-room Acton High School.

The Mackenzie tender of \$55,000 is subject to some downward revisions for changes in plans, which will pare the cost of the building somewhat.

Barnett & Rieder, Kitchener and Toronto firm of architects, have designed the school. It will be built mainly on the present school property, but adjoining property has also been purchased from the Laidlaw Estate to be added to the school grounds. Cost of the school equipment will be about \$83,000 it is estimated. The old building will not be used when the new one is completed, but will be kept in reserve for future needs. The Mackenzie tender was one of six received.

Meanwhile, the board is faced with the problem of accommodating an overflow number of students in the present 2-room building in September. Last year, Norval and Stewarttown senior grades were taken by bus to Georgetown, where

they were taught in the new Wrigglesworth public school. This room is needed locally this year, and the township pupils must find other quarters.

The school area board has decided to equip one of the buildings at Norval Recreation Centre for this purpose on a temporary basis until the new school is ready.

## Goalie Sensational as N&G's Win in Overtime

Backed up by the sensational goal tending of Freddie Cuthbert and displaying the best brand of lacrosse they have shown all season the Georgetown N&G's edged the Acton Rams 9-8 in overtime, in an intermediate OLA fixture at the Arena Wednesday night.

Acton looked much the better club in the opening period and outscored the locals 5-2. The N&G's came out fighting in the second period and showing some nice passing fired in four unanswered tallies to edge into a 6-5 lead at the half. Georgetown's sixth goal was the nicest effort of the night, five men handling the ball on a criss-cross passing play that ended with Moddis firing the ball into the net from the edge of the crease. Each team scored twice in the third stanza and the N&G's hung on to their slim one goal lead.

Watkins of Acton scored the only goal of the fourth quarter to deadlock the count 8-8 at end of regulation time. In the overtime Acton almost scored on the first play but Cuthbert made a clever save on a shot by Smith when he was in all alone. With less than three minutes to go Caruso scored the clincher for the N&G's on a partially screened drive to the top corner. Acton pressed hard in the final minutes but Cuthbert kicked out their best efforts.

Len Caruso paced the N&G's with four markers. George Grasby scored three. Zeke McCandless and Scotty Moddisson singles. For the Rams Normie Young in goal was a standout. Watkins and Smith led the Acton scores with a hat-trick apiece and Krapeck scored a pair.—S.H.

Lately, however, he has been complaining about a "whispering" campaign against him that intends to cut Old Age Pensions and Family Allowances.

Why the whisper? Surely, there should be no misunderstanding about his intent. He may not intend to reduce the amount of Family Allowance and Old Age Pensions, but he certainly intends to reduce the number of people receiving them. The Tory policy on Old Age Pensions and Family Allowances is contained in five, fatal words: "For Those Who Need It." Those words were used by Mr. Drew speaking at London. There can be no misinterpretation. They mean only one thing.

The Tories, if elected will promptly introduce a means test for Old Age Pensions and Family Allowances.

At the present time, the people in Halton county benefit each year by \$2,000,000 in Old Age Pensions and Family Allowances. No one knows how much of that amount would go to help Mr. Drew cut the national budget.

The Liberal administration has pioneered in providing social security and it is now blazing a trail toward national health insurance. Health Insurance has been high in the Liberal administration's programs to be undertaken, but premature adoption of any scheme without careful study and extensive surveys would have doomed it and probably buried it for years to come. When health insurance is introduced by the Liberal administration—and that day is not too distant—you will know that it is the best possible program designed to meet the needs and desires of the majority of the Canadian people.

Ever since the end of the war your government has followed a pay-as-you-go policy and our entire cost of re-armament has been paid out of current taxes. In addition to this, we have paid \$2,225,000,000 off the national debt. This year the Liberal administration reduced taxation by \$360,000,000. You haven't heard much said about that. The dollar in your pocket is the best dollar in the world. We have no unemployment and millions of dollars of foreign capital are being invested in Canada every year. We are more prosperous and are enjoying a higher standard of living than ever before.

And while Mr. Drew is pre-occupied with arranging Conservative excursions to Great Britain, we find that the financial pages of even the Tory press are reporting increased Canadian trade on world-wide scale. The Telegram, July 30th, on its financial page stated: "A sharp 9.3 per cent increase in the value of domestic exports in June as compared with the same month in 1952 is reported by the Bureau of Statistics."

The article continues: "Domestic exports in June were lower in value than last year to the United Kingdom, but higher to the other Commonwealth countries, the United States, Latin America and European countries."

"Average export prices for the month were about 2.1 per cent below those of June, 1952. Taking the lower prices into account, the volume of trade was consequently about 11.5 per cent greater."

Industrially, Halton county is making amazing advances and is continually expanding. A recent report pointed out that 50 per cent of the new jobs in Canada are in Ontario "and the heart of the expansion is in the county of Halton."

With payrolls at an unprecedented level and mounting daily the prosperity of this county is the envy of every other section of Canada. Under a Liberal administration the St. Lawrence Seaway is assured and will be of incalculable value to Halton County. No one, at the moment, can predict just how much this will increase employment and swell payrolls in this county. But it is a certainty that the present government plans to include this district in its development program. 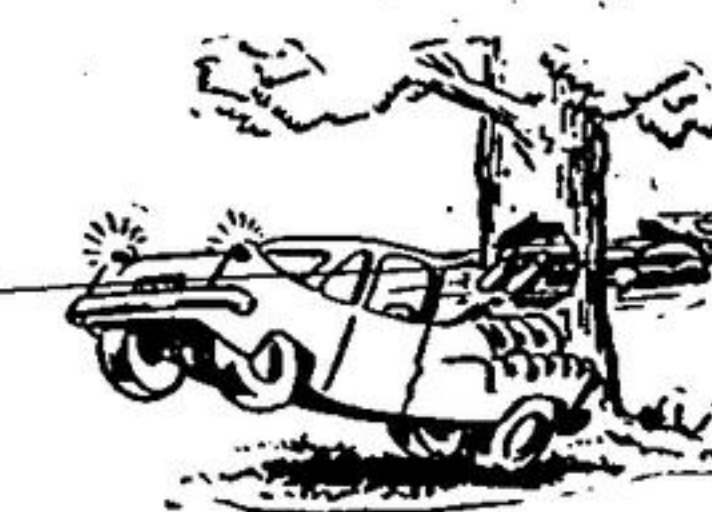
