Mr. Leslie was driving from Brampton to Georgetown when a young lad ran into the path of a car and was struck. Mr. Leslie picked the injured boy up and put him in the driver's car and he was rushed to hospital. The boy, Edward Turza, 9, was taken to Peel Memorial Hospital and died of a fractured skull and other injuries while being transferred to St. Joseph's Hospital in Toronto. Driver of the car, Robert Mitchell, Mono Road, said the boy had apparently become confused after leaving the side of the road. He was halfway across the highway when he turned back, then changed his mind and started across again. The impact knocked him into the air and he was hit by the car again and thrown 52 feet to the highway shoulder.
