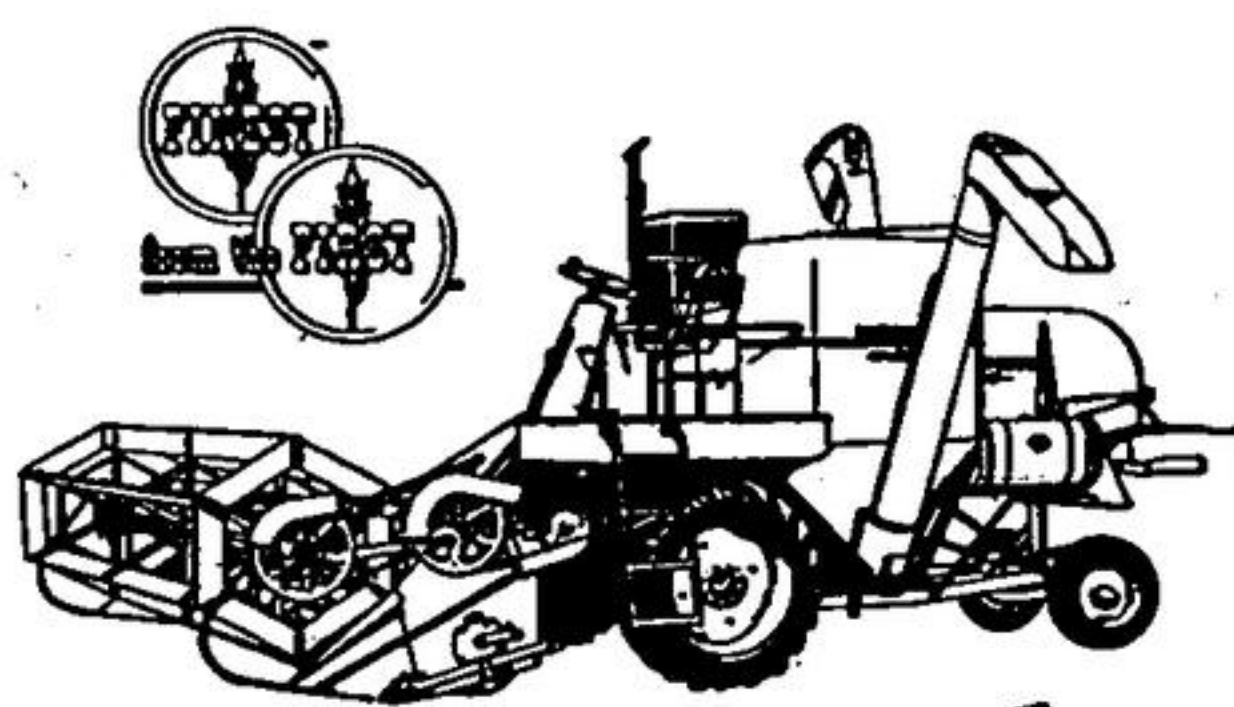

## FIFTY RURAL CLERGYMEN AT OAC SUMMER SCHOOL

More than 50 rural clergymen and their wives from many parts of Ontario, as well as New York State and Quebec, attended the fourth annual summer school for rural clergymen held at the Ontario Agricultural College from July 27th to July 31st.

The clergymen took one of three main courses intended to better acquaint them with the relation of agriculture to human welfare and community life. Twenty were enrolled in the "General Agriculture" option which dealt with all aspects of practical agriculture from soil conservation and the latest engineering developments to new developments in poultry and the role of insects in agriculture.

The same number were enrolled in the course in Human Relations, which featured discussions of man's role and development in his environment, as well as a review of Canadian literature and practical experience in radio broadcasting. The remainder studied the Business of Farming, a course accentuating the principles of farm management and marketing.

For the wives, tours and teas were arranged while their husbands applied themselves to their student roles.

### Change to Dial System Set for September 20

In just a month from now the dial telephone system will be inaugurated in Georgetown.

W. O. Misener, Bell Tele. home manager for this area, announced this week that the conversion will take place at about 7 a.m. on Sunday, September 20th.

After that time, callers will no longer hear the familiar "Number, please" when they lift the receiver, instead they will hear the humming tone which is the dial version of the well-known greeting of the operator. Coincident with the opening of the dial exchange, all Georgetown telephone numbers will be changed, and each will then include the exchange figure "Triangle 7," followed by four other digits.

With the advent of the dial system drawing near, a special group of Bell Telephone employees is currently engaged in telephoning all local subscribers to make certain they are familiar with important aspects of the dial telephone system.

This survey is being made by the Bell as part of the over-all, highly integrated program the company is carrying out to make the conversion completely successful, Mr. Misener explained.

The employees are explaining to subscribers and reproducing for them the various tones associated with the dial system. These include the "dial tone" which indicates the equipment is ready to take the call, the "busy signal" which tells the caller the line is busy, and the "ringing signal" which shows that the called person's telephone is ringing. To make certain that the subscriber knows the technique of using the dial telephone, he is asked to place a test call.
