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



Helicopter was purchased as a two year old for \$7500 from Del Miller and Johnny Simpson, She was foaled at Mengas Mills, Pa. and sold as a weaning to the Castleton Farm, one of the outstanding harness horse outfits in the world. The price was \$1150. Later at the yearling sales the former owners purchased her for \$2,000. Del Miller was retained by Armstrong as trai-

Helicopter is the first Canadian owned horse to win the three-year old classic since it was first run in 1926. In the second heat victory, Helicopter returned \$13.30, \$5.00 and \$7.80 in the mutuels and in the third heat \$4.80, \$2.80 and \$3.30.

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

#### Paris Minister Again Preacher at St. John's

It was union congegrations at St. John's United Church on Sunday morning, with the Rev. Royal E. Newman, of Parls, Ont. again the guest minister. It was quite easy to recognize that Mr. Newman loves boys and girls as he spoke to them about obedience to father and mother and to God when, out of their love and experience, they advised us what not to do; and as he showed them with a mousetrap whatnearly always happens when we disobey. He pleased the Junior Worshippers and himself too when he shook hands with each boy and girl before they went to their own worship service.

For his scripture lesson and ser mon he used the 139th Psalm, "O Lord thou hast searched me and known me, Thou knowest my downsitting and mine uprising, Thou understandest my thoughts afar off."

For his text he used the last two verses of the Psalm "Search me, O God, and know my heart, try me and know my thoughts and see if there be any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting."

David knew God as the all-seeing, ever-present providence. All the experience of his full and colorful life had taught him that he couldn't flee from God's presence no matter where he went; God would be there ready ever to still lead him and uphold him. We have just as much evidence of God's presence in the world about us: how far has our material possessions, our riches, our pride, our independence, taken us away from our reliance on God, our creator and sustainer? Is it only when tragedy strikes, that we try to believe God understands, and is near and ready to listen to our prayers? Mr. Newman cited a personal case where a young man, about 20, apparently quite well, stricken with polio; and where he had to try and teach those in the home. that their attitude of weeping and despair was having an adverse effect on the young man's, chances of regaining his health. With their combined prayers and change of attitude to nearer that of David's in the Psaim, he suggested a celebration for Jim's homecoming. It was still hard for them to believe that much, but he came home, is working again and has lovely boy and girl twins.

How much better and happier would our world be if we could regain some of our former confidence

in God and reliance on Him; readjust our values of character, honesty, fair dealing, truthfulness; get down to firm, worthwhile and last-

ing use of our time and talents. In the text David says: "Search me, O God, and know my heart, Try me and know my thoughts, and see if there be any wicked way in me." How wonderful if He could search us and find none. Yet we know he would find some. how wise to use the closing words of David in this Psalm, "And lead me in the way everlasting."
