## Council Asks Highway Diversion Via Maple Ave.

Opening up the Maple Avenue right-of-way to link the east and west portions of that street, could be done at very small expense to Georgetown if county and province cooperate, in the opinion of Mayor Armstrong.

A strong delegation from council will interview the Dept. of Highways about this matter, which ties into possible plans for extending Georgetown's water system now being discussed by council.

The Maple extension came up after council had heard engineer Roberts' report, recommending a second water source and a reservoir, when the mayor said it would be an opportune time for establishing a roadway which sooner or later must be done.

While the town is running water and sewer lines along the right-of-way, it would be economical to proceed with the road itself, he believes.

Technically, Maple Avenue is the county link with No. 7 and there would be a good chance of the county paying 50 per cent of the cost, he said. And if the highway department could be persuaded to make this a sub-highway to route traffic through without passing down the narrow, hilly stretch at present in use, another 25 per cent might be available there.

The deputations will have a good story to tell the department.

In the mayor's opinion it is foolish for the government to continue its present plan of buying up land bordering No. 7 from town limits to Normandy Boulevard and do an expensive widening job, only to have this end in a bottleneck down thru the flats and up the church hill. This, he feels, would accomplish nothing and cost a lot of money.

The department would be much further ahead to share the cost of finishing Maple Avenue. Two traffic avenues would then be available. A growing nuisance of narrow turns for buses at Guelph and Water Streets and at Mill and Main would be eliminated at the same time, as buses could proceed along Maple, then straight along Main to the depot.

## ACTON COUNCIL PROTESTS SCHOOL COST ESTIMATE

UPS \$185,000 BOARD FIGURE BY \$25,000

Difference of opinion as to how much the new Acton high school will cost has led the council of that town to pass a borrowing-by-law \$25,000 in excess of the requisition from North Halton district board.

When the school board first tackled the problem of building a complete new 7-room school in Acton, a 4-room addition at Georgetown and one extra room at Milton, approval was given by the five municipalities concerned to spend a total of \$350,000 on the project. The money was apportioned by the architect at \$210,000 for Acton, \$120,000 for Georgetown and \$20,000 for Milton.

Tenders which have been accepted, all from J. B. Mackenzie and Son of Georgetown, and Acton, were low in the case of Acton, high in the other two. A month ago, the board secretary was verbally instructed by the board to increase the Georgetown figure \$25,000 and decrease Acton—the same amount, as it was felt \$185,000 would be am-

"I want some pressure put on the county engineer to resurface lower Main Street" said road chairman Stan Allen at the last meeting of Georgetown council.

Mr. Allen said that Georgetown has been getting the run-around from the county, and if they don't intend to keep the connecting links in a good state of repair, the town should stop paying taxes and look after the work itself.

Reminded by Deputy Reeve Petch that engineer Roy Smith had recently said that Main Street from Church to Park Avenue would be looked after, Cr. Allen retorted: "Yes, and I doubt if his promises stay in his mind until he leaves town."

Mr. Allen, who lives on River Drive, also a county link, said he was "fed up" with eating dust on that street this year, too.

The county engineer is in quite a spot, Mayor Armstrong said, because this year the county road grant was cut by \$80,000 by the government and there just isn't the money to do all that's necessary. Reeve Kenneth MacDonald said Burlington had been threatening to take matters into their own hands too, but of course this could not be legally done.

The best that council could decide about the matter was to write a strong letter to county council, pointing out the urgency of the repair work needed here.
