Council Asks Highway Diversion Via Maple Ave.

Opening up the Maple Avenue right-of-way to link the east and west portions of that street, could be done at very small expense to Georgetown if county and province cooperate, in the opinion of Mayor Armstrong.

A strong delegation from council will interview the Dept. of Highways about this matter, which ties anto possible plans for extending Georgetown's water system now be discussed by council.

The Maple extension came up after council had heard engineer Robetrs' report, recommending a second water source and a reservoir, when the mayor said it would be an opportune time for establishing roadway which sooner or later must be done.

While the town is running water and sewer lines along the right-ofwey, it would be economical to proceed with the road itself, he believes. Technically, Maple Avenue is the county link with No. 7 and there would be a good chance of the county paying 50 per cent of the cost, he said. And if the highway department could be persuaded to make this a sub-highway to route traffic through without passdng down the narrow, hilly stretch at present in use, another 25 per cent might be available there. ACTON COUNCIL PROTESTS SCHOOL COST ESTIMATE

UPS \$185,000 BOARD FIGURE BY \$25,000

Difference of opinion as to how much the new Acton high school will cost has led the council of that town to pass a borrowing by-law \$25,000 in excess of the requisition from North Halton district board.

When the school board first tackled the problem of building a complete new 7-room school in Acton, a 4-room addition at Georgetown and one extra room at Milton, approval was given by the five municipalities concerned to spend a total of \$350,000 on the project. The money was apportioned by the arthitect at \$210,000 for Acton, \$120,000 for Georgetown and \$20,000 for Mil-

To clarify the matter, a motion was passed at the meeting, against the opposition of two Acton board members, confirming the verbal instructions previously given to the secretary.
