Georgetown voters, at this Decem-
ber's election, may be asked to
express opinion on whether land
should be acquired by the town for
future industrial expansion.

The matter was discussed at the
last council meeting, after word of
the new Cleave subdivision had
been received. Council members,
feeling that less and less large
tracts of land in town limits are
becoming available for industry, had
a general discussion about the sub-
ject.

The question would be put as a
plebiscite, asking for council autho-
rity to expropriate, lease or buy
land for industrial purposes. Any
such question must be decided by
by-law before October 1st.

The industrial committee, headed
by Cr. Doug Sargent, was asked to
study the question and bring a re-
commendation to the next council
meeting.

A borrowing by-law for \$27,000
for the Ewing and Elm Street ex-
tension and paving was sent to the
Municipal Board after having its
first two readings.

Ten year debentures will be is-
sued to pay for this, and the town
will get a 50 per cent grant from
the government on the work.

Town foreman Ern Hyde was
granted free water because of extra
attention to the water system which
his duties entail.

Complaints of storm sewers on
Sarah Street being hooked into the
sanitary system were received from
residents of the street.

After a heavy rainstorm, it is
said the sewers backed up into cel-
lars on the street, causing quite a
nuisance. Council will try to over-
come the situation by seeking ano-
ther solution to the drainage prob-
lem.
