The department incorporates all CNR highway bus and truck services, except those of the express, into a single unit for greater efficiency and economy of operation.

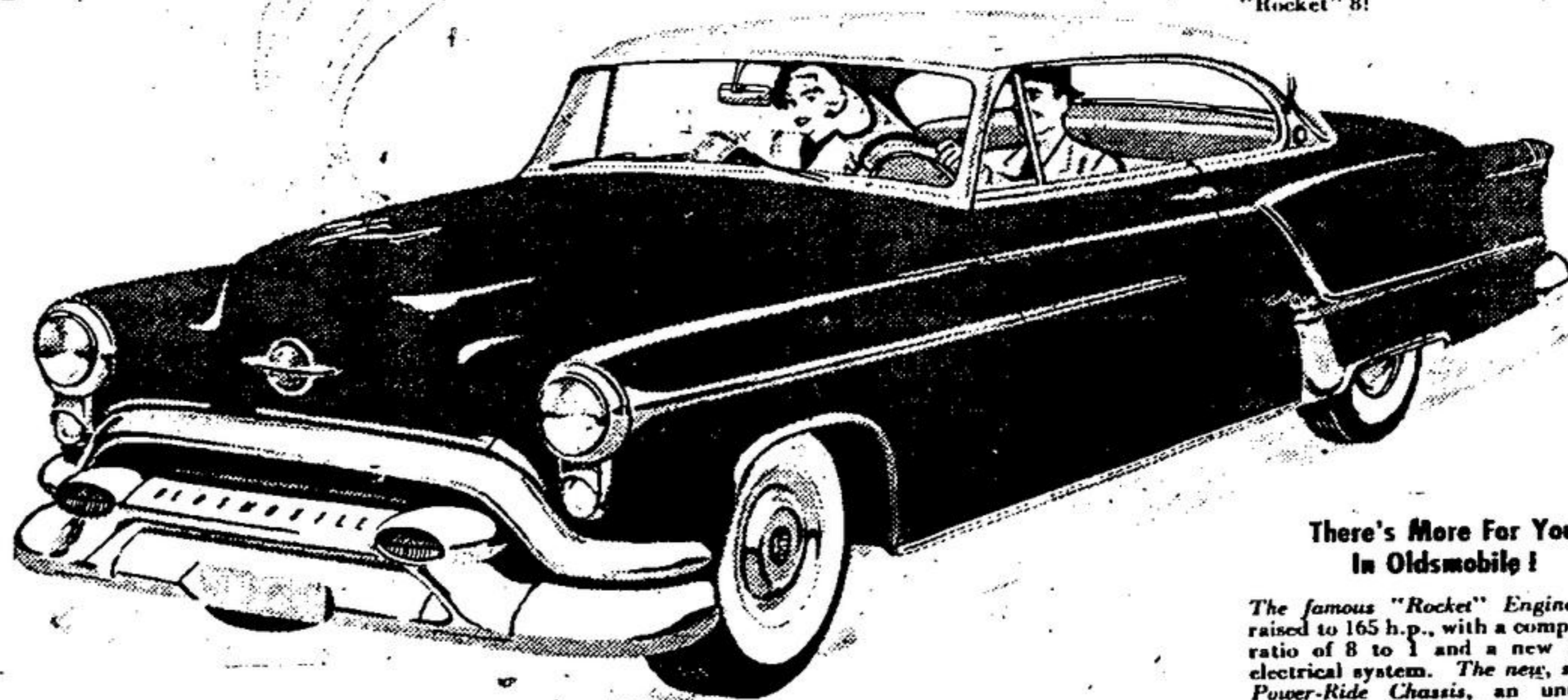
