**Institute Sees Movies
Of Pre-War Trip Abroad**

The highlight of the August meeting of Ballinafad Women's Institute was one half hour of beautiful motion pictures which Mr. and Mrs. Stewart Bennett of Scotsdale Farms had taken during a European tour in 1938.

Mrs. Bennett showed the movies and told of their experience in pre-war Europe, particularly telling of Germany where their pictures were confiscated for a time and of Dieppe which they had also visited. Mrs. Norman Sinclair thanked Mrs. Bennett for the educational half hour.

The meeting was held in Ballinafad Hall with the president, Mrs. Tom Gibson in the chair. Plans were made for the presentation of an evening of Barber Shop Harmony in Acton public school auditorium on October 15th. The project this fall will be the sewing of children's clothing. It will be held from November 30th through to December 4th.

The roll call was answered by naming one benefit of a high school education. Mrs. Maurice Baker was convener of the meeting which had Education as its theme. Mrs. F. J. Shortill gave current events and Mrs. Leo Jamieson read the motto: "The intelligence of the people is the security of the nation."

In her talk she said: "It is almost impossible to write briefly on this subject because it involves so much — as we look around and survey the world in which we live today, surrounded by chaos, confusion and insecurity, we cannot help but realize the deep significance of these words."

As the family goes — so goes the nation — that is a fundamental truth from which there is no escape — the family being the basic unit of society we can readily see that nations are but enlarged families — it was God's plan that mankind form families; and families, communities; and communities, nations. Thus in God's plan, patriotism is love of family extended to the nation. The importance of a good family life built on a sound and solid foundation cannot be too strongly stressed — life isn't funny and it isn't free — it can be — and often is very dangerous, and each one of us has a grave responsibility to God, to our country and to our fellowman.

The sermon on the Mount is an historical document of the first rank — in it the proclamations made by Christ form the first and most far-reaching Magna Charta given for the real liberation and true freedom of mankind.

A satisfactory society must be founded on deep knowledge and intelligence — but how is this deep knowledge to be attained? The natural answer would seem to be that it is to be attained through an intensive use of the resources of the intellect — true education alone can save the world, and we must recognize the brotherhood of man — what, for other races it is based upon an openminded and careful investigation of the known facts — it is quite safe to say this is not ordinarily the case.

People believe that they are superior because they wish to so believe — a real lover of his mother country will recognize both her defects and her virtues — he will do his part to develop the latter, and remove the former. True patriotism never leads to injustice.

When each citizen has a blind faith in the complete superiority of his own country in every conceivable respect then he has ceased to think rationally and with intelligence. Such faith is not based on fact — it is based on a blind impulse to exalt one's own country simply because it is one's own country and when the citizens of each nation are moved by this same spirit then international agreement becomes very difficult and the nations fail to agree because they literally will not listen to reason — are we not witnessing this very thing today in the various peace conferences which have up to now been such appalling miserable failures.

God has stated His terms for world peace — 1. Thou shalt love the Lord Thy God with thy whole heart — with thy whole soul, with thy whole strength and with thy whole mind. 2. Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself. These are the terms according to His law.

World peace is a matter to be determined by the individuals of the world. It can be won if I, and each other individual, will but live a life of Christlike love towards other individuals, regardless of color or race or creed. It will not be long before we begin to influence others until the whole atmosphere of our neighbourhood is changed. The neighbourhood in its turn spreads its influence and so what began as a ripple soon assumes the proportions of a tidal wave of Christlike living. But the initial effort belongs to me — one individual.

In summing up this motto "The intelligence of the people is the security of the nation" — we must attain this intelligence from true education — education is not merely the imparting of factual knowledge — much less is it developing expertness in technical work — it should be above all else, the training of the will to the will of God
