GLÉN WILLIAMS
Mrs. John Hepburn Sr. Forty Years in Glen

A resident of Glen Williams for over forty years, Mrs. John Hepburn, Sr., 83, died yesterday in Toronto.

Mrs. Hepburn had been in failing health for some time and loss of her eyesight a year ago handicapped her greatly. She had lately been living in town at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Reeve.

During the war she was an active worker for the Red Cross. She also took a great interest in her church, being a member of Jarvis Street Baptist Church, Toronto, and also attending the Baptist Church in town.

The former Christina Booth Howie, she was a native of Scotland. With her husband, she came to Canada 47 years ago, and lived for a short time at Hamilton before moving to Glen Williams, Mr. Hepburn died five years ago.

She is survived by four sons and three daughters, Mrs. William Schenk, (Evelyn) and John of Glen Williams, Mrs. P. W. T. Farr (Ethel), Mrs. C. W. Willis (Doris), Eleanor and James, all of Toronto, and Norman of Klamath Falls, Oregon.

A daughter, Mrs. Leonard Marchment died three years ago and another daughter Marion in 1921.

The funeral service in Toronto on Thursday morning will be followed by interment in Hamilton Cemetery later in the afternoon.

Seek Night School Move to Georgetown

At a meeting called for the purpose of discussing night schools in Georgetown and Acton, Dick Licata was appointed to head a committee to investigate full details.

Representatives of various organizations were asked to the meeting at the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Newman last Wednesday. Mr. Lloyd Minshall, representing the communities programs branch of the Department of Education was in attendance and outlined the requirements which must be met and how such schools can be conducted.

For the past three years, a very successful school has been operated at Milton, with prospects pointing to this being held again this winter. Some Georgetown and Acton people, particularly members of arts and crafts groups, think that the school should be moved in succession to other communities, particularly as the regulations state that a night school can be held in one location for no more than two years, except under exceptional circumstances.

It was the opinion of the meeting that it might be too late to move the complete school this year, but perhaps certain classes could be held in Georgetown and Acton. Mr. Licata's committee will report back to a later meeting.

WOLVES TAKE CLOSE ACTON SOCCER MATCH

One of the liveliest soccer matches of the season delighted 300 spectators at Acton Friday when Georgetown Wolves won 3-2. It was a good, clean, game, ably refereed by Dave Bowman.

Larry Nolan scored first for the Wolves and added a second later in the match. Larry now has a crop of goals in the season and is well justified in centre forward position as top goal scorer.

During the first half both teams showed excellent defence work, with a wonderful display by Georgetown's Vassallo, one of the best exhibitions of amateur goalkeeping seen in a long time. Pete Schipper and Andy Nolan were also outstanding on defence.

Greatest deficiency at present is the forward line which needs strengthening to pay dividends in more goals.

The whole 90 minutes kept everyone in suspense. The remark of an Acton spectator sums it up: With games like that soccer will draw bigger and bigger crowds. It was a great match. Georgetown were the better team, and as such, won. —J.W.
