



Seek Night School Move to Georgetown

At a meeting called for the purpose of discussing night schools in Georgetown and Acton, Dick Licata was appointed to head a committee to investigate full details.

Representatives of various organizations were asked to the meeting at the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Newman last Wednesday, Mr.Lloyd Minshall, representing the communities programs branch of the Department of Education was in attendance and outlined the requirements which must be met and how such schools can be conducted.

For the past three years, a very successful school has been operated at Milton, with prospects pointing to this being held again this winter. Some Georgetown and Acton people, particularly members of arts and crafts groups, think that the school should be moved in succession to other communities, particularly as the regulations state that a night school can be held in one location for no more than two years, except under exceptional circumstances.

It was the opinion of the meeting that it might be too late to move the complete school this year, but perhaps certain classes could be held in Georgetown and Acton. Mr. Licata's committée will report back to a later meeting.

WOLVES TAKE CLOSE ACTON SOCCER MATCH

One of the liveliest soccer matches of the season delighted 300 spectators at Acton Friday when Georgetown Wolves won 3-2. It was a good, clean, game, ably refereed by Dave Bowman.

During the first half both teams showed excellent defence work, with a wonderful display by Georgetown's Vassallo, one of the best exhibitions of amateur goaltending seen in a long time. Pete Schipper and Andy Nolan were also outstanding on defence.


