CADETS ESCAPE INJURY

There were 44 cadets and four officers in the bus, which had been chartered from Woodstock, Lt. William S. Hodges, commanding officer of the Stratford corps, was in charge and the three other officers were Sub. Lieut. E. G. Cree, Sub. Lieut. G. Richards and Rev. G. N. Schaus, the corps padre.

Lt. Hodges said the accident happened at about 9:30 a.m. At the time all the cadets were singing sea chantees.

"There are a series of bumps on the road at that point and it seems that these caused the bus to get out of control," said Lt. Hodges. The next thing we knew was the bus veering off to the right, crashing through about ten guard rails, and turning over on its side about 15 feet down the embankment."

"Luckily we came to rest against a tree, otherwise we would have rolled a lot farther down the embankment."

Lt. Hodges, who was sitting directly behind the driver Robert Hale, 48, Woodstock, said he was thrown to the other side of the bus by the impact. Everyone was jumbled in a heap on one side.

His first action was to open the emergency door at the rear of the bus and then went to the assistance of the driver who was badly shaken but not injured.

"It was an awful feeling watching the boys as they were piled up inside the bus, wondering if they would all get up," he said. "Fortunately, all except Cadet Morrice were able to walk out unaided."

Lt. Hodges had high praise for the way the cadets conducted themselves. "There was absolutely no panic," he said. "They all behaved wonderfully."

As soon as all the boys were out of the overturned bus, Mr. Schaus gathered them together at the roadside and said a prayer of thanksgiving. "There was never a better time for a thanksgiving," commented Lt. Hodges.

A Georgetown doctor, called by the police, gave attention to the cadets who had been injured. Provincial Constable Howard Gunn, Milton, who was in charge of the investigation said that damage to the coach was estimated at \$1500, mostly to the roof.

A bus chartered at Georgetown brought the cadets and officers back to Stratford Saturday afternoon, the proposed visit to the CNE being cancelled.

It was the original intention to take Cadet Morrice to the Stratford General Hospital, but he became unconscious during the journey and ambulance driver Ray Whitnee decided to take him to Guelph hospital.

Expenses of the sea cadets' trip to Toronto were being met out of a \$50 grant from the Navy League of Canada and a \$50 prize won in a Navy League competition by Midshipman Robert Campbell, a member of the Stratford corps.

It had been planned, for about 30 Stratford cadets to take the trip to the CNE, but because of the rain Saturday morning a number decided not to go.
