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

Was Georgetown Hydro Superintendent 25 Years

A pioneer hydro man in Georgetown, where he helped instal the first electric lights and services in the town, Benjamin James Forster, 83, died in Toronto Western Hospital on September 7th.

A native of Gravenhurst, he had been in failing health for some years. Mr. Forster had a fall two weeks before his death and fractured his hip. He was taken to Western Hospital and there bronchial pneumonia set in, which was the immediate cause of death.

Mr. Forster worked for some time at the old Dynamo which at that time generated power to the Provincial Paper Mill. He then came to Georgetown and helped instal hydro services and electric lights. He held the position of hydro supenintendent for over 25 years.

His wife, Edith Snyder, and two daughters Marver (Mrs. Ernest Cummings) and Pearl predeceased him. He is survived by two daughters, and three sons, Mrs. Percy Hetherington (Grace) of Toronto, Mrs. Walter Richardson (Helen), Donald and Richard, Georgetown and Jack of Welland.

The tuneral service was held on Wednesday at the McClure Funeral Home with Rev. John M. Smith conducting the service. Pallbearers were Bernard Armstrong, . Gordon Graham, Bill Hyde, Theodore Haines, Clifford Grace and Walter Richardson, Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, .Georgetown.

Manager Gives Tips On How to Use Dial

Though the e-mipment necessary to provide dial telephone service is extremely complicated, there's nothing complicated about using the dial telephone. And once a few simple procedures are understood, people find it an invaluable aid and servant in their business and social

As a guide for Georgetown' telephone users who may not be very familiar with the new service being inaugurated on Sept. 20, W. O. Misener, Bell Telephone manager for this area, has provided the following suggestions about use of the

dial telephone. The tirst important step is to be certain you have the correct number. If in doubt, consult your supplementary directory. If the number is not listed, dial "Operator" to

get the information. When you have the number, pick up the receiver and hold it to your ear. Listen' for the dial tone. This steady humming sound is equivalent to the "number please" of the opcrator and tells you that the dial equipment is ready for your call. If you do not hear the dial tone, or if someone else is using the line,

hang up and call again later. To dial, place your index finger firmly in the dial opening through which the first figure of the telephone number desired appears, Pull the dial steadily around to the finger stop. Then remove your finger and allow the dial-to spin back by itself. Do not try to hurry it, for doing so can result in a wrong number. If your finger slips or you make a mistake, replace the receiver for a few seconds and start over

After you have dialed all the letters and figures of the number, listen for the signals. A soft intermittent bur-r-r signifies that the called telephone is ringing. A buzzbuzz-buzz means that it is busy. Rarely, you may hear a tone similar to a siren. This indicates there is no such number. When you hear this, hang up, consult your direc-

tory, and dial again. Give the person you call time to reach his telephone. Wait for about 10 rings before you hang up.

When you talk, speak directly into the transmitter, lips about a quarter of an inch from the mouthpiece. Distinct speech gets better results.

When finished, replace the receiver carefully. Always replace the receiver gently immediately after

completing a call. This keeps the

telephone ready for action. Subscribers with party line service will find that service - as before - just as good as each party makes it. When everybody is courteous and considerate, each party gets full value from his telephone.

Under the dial system, a subscriber with two-party service who wishes to call the other party on his line, should dial 1191 and hang up. Both telephones will ring. The ringing stops when the other party answers. The caller should remove his receiver promptly and begin the conversation. If ringing does not stop, he should remove the receiver for a moment to stop the ringing. On rural lines the procedure is the same except that, instead of 1191, the caller dials the last four figures of the telephone number of the person he wishes to call.

If, while you are dialing, another party comes on the line, say that the line is in use. When he hangs up, replace your receiver for a moment, listen again for the dial tone,

and dial the number once more. If for any reason you are unable to dial or if difficulties are encountered, dial "Operator." Operators are always on duty to assist you.

SOIL TYPE Non-Fertilizer Fertilized 4220 lb. 1876 lb. CLAY LOAM 4376 lb. LOAM 1796 lb. SAND (poorly drained) 2175 lb. 3315 lb. 2058 1ь. LOAM (shallow & droughty) 1209 lb.

These figures all add up to the fact that it pays dividends to fertilize pastures.

Fall application of an analysis such as 0-16-8 or 2-16-6 is recommended.
