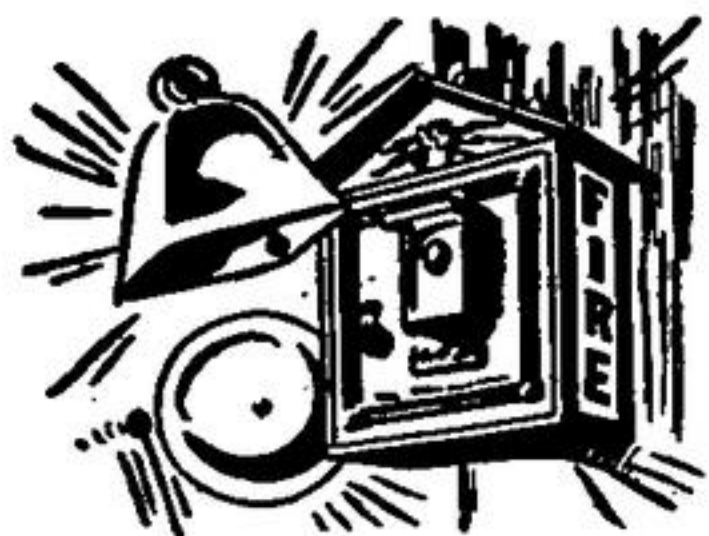

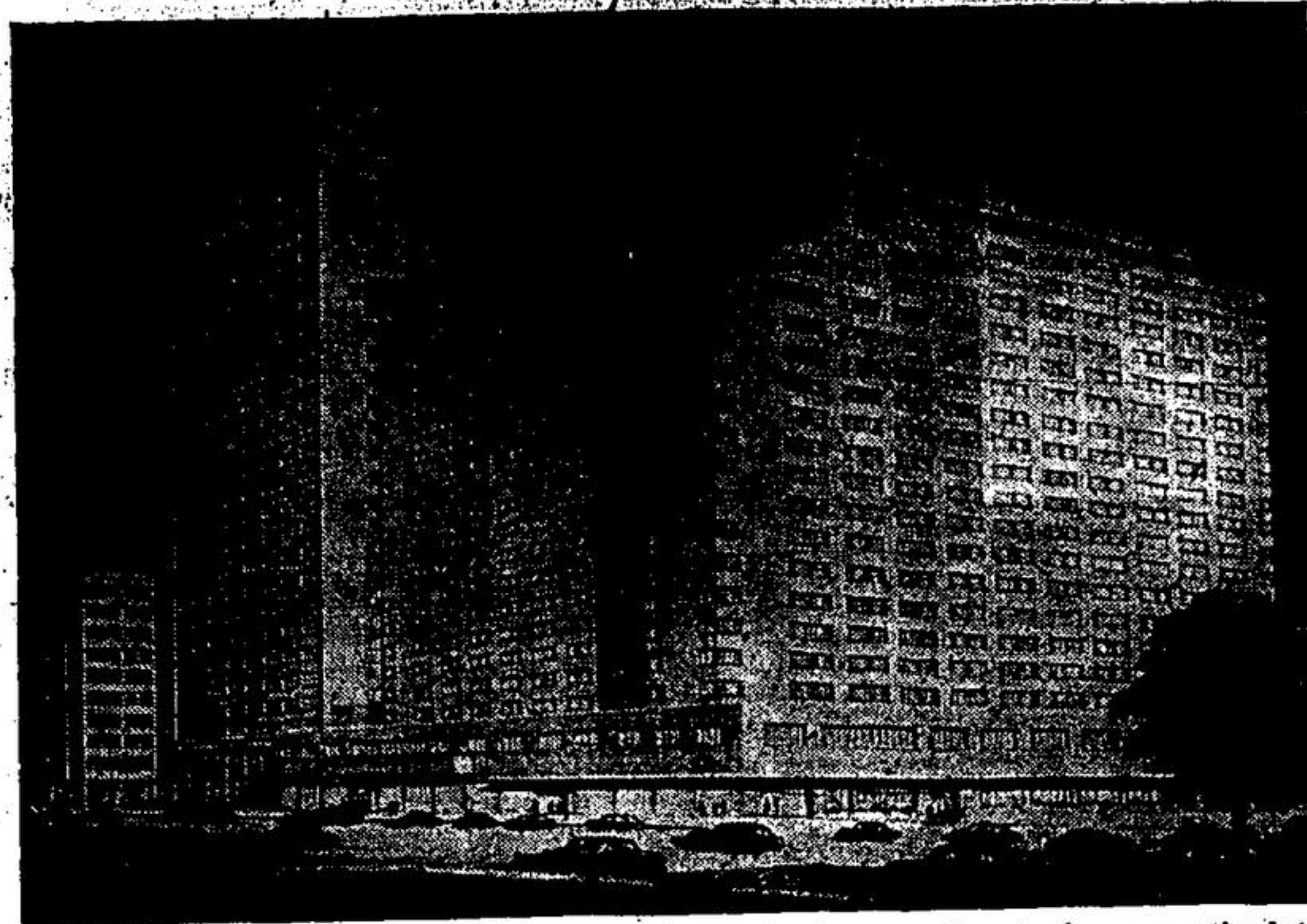

C.N.R. TO BUILD BIG HOTEL IN MONTREAL — Plans for the construction of a large convention hotel on the Central Station site in Montreal have been approved by the Canadian National Railways board of directors and will be included in the railway's budget when it is submitted to the occasional parliamentary committee on railways as part of the financial programme to be laid before Parliament at the next session, Donald Gordon, chairman and president, has announced. The 20-storey, \$20,000,000 hotel will have upwards of 1,000 rooms and convention space capable of seating 4,000 persons at meetings and 2,500 at banquets. It will benefit all agencies engaged in the travel and tourist industry and will do much to attract conventions and visitors to Canada, and will be of great and direct benefit to Montreal, the Province of Quebec and Canada as a whole, Mr. Gordon stated.
The architect's drawing shows the new hotel facing on Dorchester Street (left) and Mansfield Street (right.) At the far left of the sketch is the present International Aviation Building, also owned by the C.N.R., and an idea of the size of the new hotel is to be had by comparing the bulk of the two buildings. Between the hotel and the Aviation Building is a sketch of the new headquarters office building which is planned for later development. The hotel is part of a carefully-conceived terminal area development plan which has been under discussion between the railway and the city of Montreal for several years. Sixty More Pupils Public Schools Grow

An increase of sixty local pupils is noted this year in the Georgetown public schools, although there is actually only a slight number more in the classrooms.

Last year there were 583 pupils enrolled, but 43 of these were brought in by bus each day from Norval and Stewarttown. This year, mounting enrolment made it impossible for the outside students to be accommodated and a temporary classroom has been established in Norval until their new 3-room school is ready.

Total attendance figures compiled by the principals here show 595 attending at present. There are 365 at Chapel Street School, compared with 380 last year, the decrease being accounted for by transferring about 20 to the other school and by a drop in kindergarten enrolment. Last year 160 local boys and girls were registered at Wrigglesworth School and this year the figure has been boosted to 230, with a new teacher engaged for an extra classroom.

Mrs. Frank Cleave, who taught last year in Toronto, is the new staff member at Wrigglesworth. Other teachers are Principal William Kinrade, Marion Scarlett, Margaret Cleghorn, Jean Ruddell and Mrs. Harold Henry.

At Chapel Street School, Mrs. Walter Sargent, who taught last year at Stewarttown, joined the staff, filling the vacancy caused by Beatrice Hume's retirement. Other staff members remain the same — Principal Harold Henry, Mrs. James

Evans, Luena Campbell Wilma Stull, Mr. V. Stein, Mrs. H. C. Wrigglesworth, Marie Lindsay, Laura Scott, and Mrs. J. Dwyer.

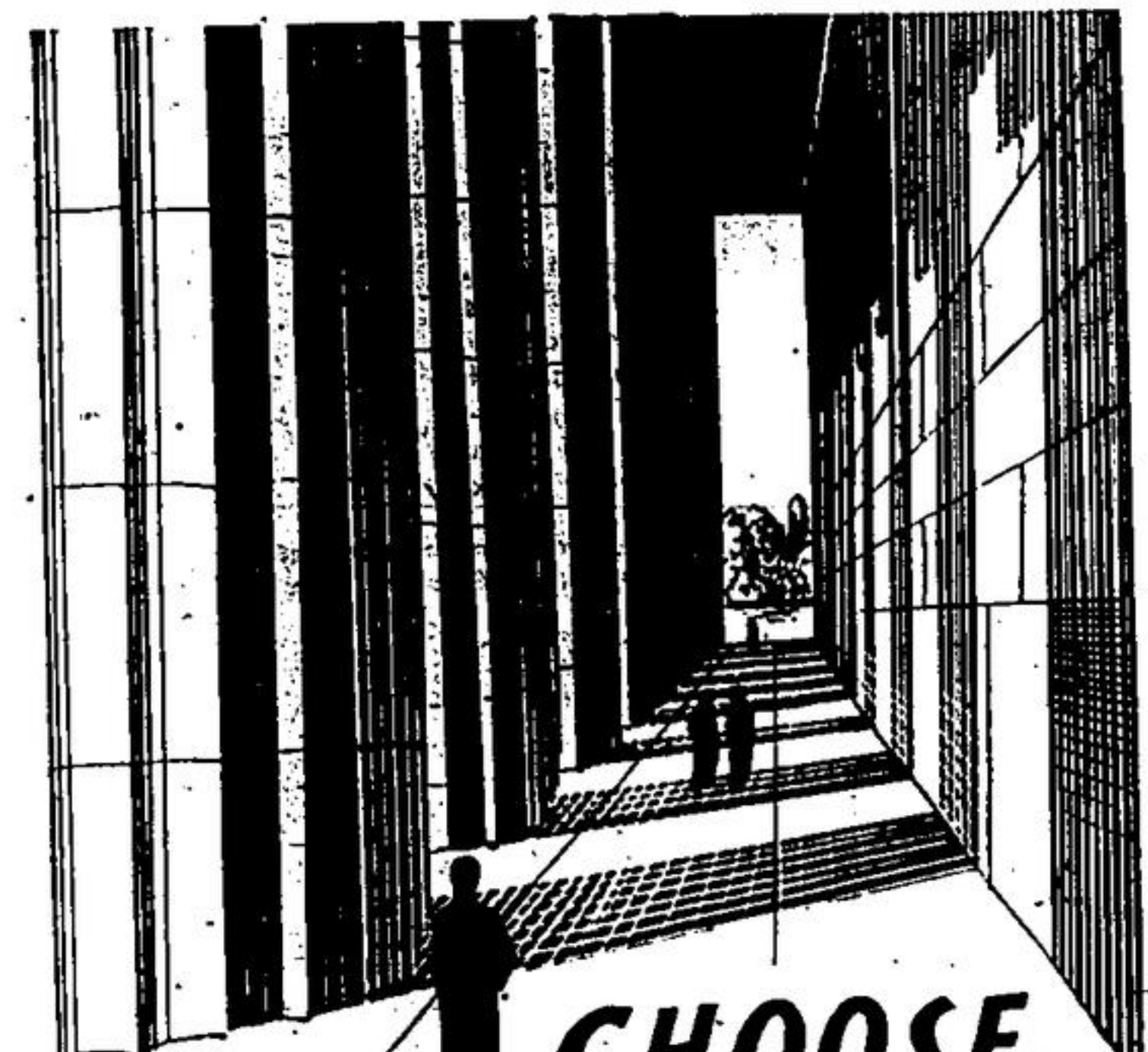
